## COTTAGES FOR WIVES.

Legislative Appropriations Available for Houses at Soldiers' Home.

Three members of the Grand Army of the Republic and the same number from the Women's Relief Corps held a meeting in Portland last week to confer regarding the construction of cottages on the ground occupied by the Soldiers' Home at Roseburg for widows of old soldiers who are inmates of the Home. At the last department encampment of the G. A. R. this committee was appointed to use their efforts to secure from the state legislature an appropriation for this purpose. The members of G. A. R. on the committee are George A. Harding, of Oregon City; B. E. Pike, of Morrow county, and G. E. Calkins, of Portland. Through the hard work of Mr. Pike, seconded by Governor Chamberlain, who entered heartily into the project, an appropriation of \$2000 was made, and the Governor was named in the bill as the sole supervisor of the distribution of the funds.

## Jagger Estate Appraised.

Appraisal of the estate of the late Benjamin Jagger was filed in the county court Friday. The property in Clackamas county is appraised at \$19,000, and in Multnomah there is real estate valued at \$63,500, consisting of lot 1, block 7, \$20,000; undivided one-half of lot 4, Park block 2, \$20,000, and the undivided one-half of lot 3, Park block 3, \$12,500.

## PART OF TOWN WAS VACATED

Eagle Creek Is No Longer a Place With Streets.

## EFFORT TO BOOM FAILED

Property Worth \$150,000 Is At Stake in Circuit Court—Divorce Mill Is Grinding.

County court has granted the petition of E. N. and Elsie J. Foster and Noah Stingley for the vacation of a portion of the streets and alleys of the town of Eagle Creek on the line of the Oregon Water Power & Railway Company, about 18 miles from this city. The petition was filed some months ago and was refused, as Earl E. Elliott, who had purchased property in the townsite after it was platted, remonstrated. Later the petitioners came into court again and the members of the court went to Eagle Creek to look over the situation. Elliott paid \$500 for a tract, which cost him at the rate of \$4000 an acre. He expended about \$1300 in improvements. Foster alleged that Elliott agreed to take \$50 in payment of possible damages, but the petitioners declined to pay the amount, but Elliott denies this story. Only a portion of the lots and blocks of the town were vacated, however, as follows:

Blocks 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7, and lots 4 to 14 inclusive in block 1, and that portion of Railroad avenue south of the southerly boundary of First street; all of the alleys through blocks 5, 6 and 7; all of that certain alley lying on the westerly boundary of blocks 1, 2, 3 and 4; all of First street between blocks 1 and 2; all of Second street between blocks 2 and 3, and 6 and 7; all of Third street between blocks 3, 4, 5 and 6; all of Fourth street south of blocks 4 and 5.

Circuit Judge McBride has taken under advisement the case of H. Wollenberg, surviving partner and administrator of the estate of S. Marks, deceased, vs. H. Walling et al. The case was sent up from Douglas county, as Judge Hamilton, who presides in that circuit, had appeared as attorney for one of the litigants. A huge mass of papers, packed in several large boxes, came up from Roseburg to County Clerk Greenman. Close to \$150,000 worth of property is involved in the suit, which was brought to set aside a deed that was executed in Russia, by which it is alleged that the defendant obtained from the Russian heirs of Marks real estate and personal property worth \$150,000 for \$16,000, and that the transfer was obtained by fraud and misrepresentation. The depositions were in the Russian, English and Yiddish tongues. Judge Fullerton of Roseburg, and Judge Benson represent the defendant, while Judge E. B. Watson is Wollenberg's attorney.

## THOUSANDS WILL COME

Meteorite to Be Exhibited in Oregon City.

## DR. CARL SETS THE PACE

Litigants Consented to Have Molten Mass Displayed in Courthouse Square.

Thousands of people from all over the United States will be given an opportunity to view the famous meteor, which will be placed on the courthouse square within a few weeks. The molten mass was discovered more than a year ago in West Oregon City, and has been in litigation ever since. Twice has the Oregon Iron & Steel Company been awarded the huge piece of iron, but counter claims are still pending and notice of appeal has been given in the supreme court. The meteorite weighs probably 15 tons and is the second largest in the world and the largest in the United States.

To Dr. W. E. Carl belongs the credit of initiating the movement to place the meteor on exhibition in this city. He saw that thousands of Fair visitors would be attracted to Oregon City, and after a great deal of trouble secured the consent of the litigants to have it placed in the courthouse square, pending settlement of the litigation. While permission has not been granted formally by the county court, the matter has been referred to Judge Ryan with power to act, and it is understood that the judge will give his consent, providing restrictions are placed about the mass, to prevent depredations to county property.

The meteor will be situated on the north side of the courthouse, and a place will be made in the alley where people may have a splendid view.
