

FOSTERS' APPEAL.

Demand Further Vacation of Eagle Creek Streets and Alleys.

Vacation of every street and alley in the town of Eagle Creek is demanded by E. N. Foster and his wife, Elsie J. Foster, who filed with County Clerk Greenman, through their attorney, H. E. Cross, a transcript of appeal.

Some months ago Mr. and Mrs. Foster, who had platted the townsite of Eagle Creek, filed a petition in the county court for the vacation of its streets and alleys. Booming a townsite was found to be not all that was expected, and lots did not sell readily. Back to the belief of acreage tracts went the Fosters, but the county court refused to grant the petition, because of the remonstrances of Earl E. Elliott, who had expended his good money in town lots and had erected a building, in the hope that some day the place would grow.

After waiting a few months, the Fosters filed a second petition, and Elliott again remonstrated. This time the members of the county court drove to Eagle Creek, and made a careful inspection of the townsite, and their visit resulted in an order that vacated a portion of the streets and alleys. It now appears that Mr. and Mrs. Foster are not satisfied with the partial vacation and are going before the circuit court with the matter. Attorney Grant B. Dimick represents the remonstrator.

Accidentally Shot.

Sommer was called and extracted the bullet, and it is expected that the boy's recovery will be a matter of only a few weeks.
