His assailant, Clarence Osburn, was arrested, and gave \$10 cash bail to appear before Justice Hipp on a charge of assault and battery. His trial has been set for Monday, July 17. It seems that a party of men, accompanied by some boys, went into the saloon several nights ago, and were ordered to leave the place by Surber. Vengeance evidently rankled in their hearts, for about 2 o'clock Sunday morning they entered the side door of the place and were again ordered to leave. One of them, a boy named Cannon, did go out, but the others stayed, and as Surber bent over to look the side door, with the intention of compelling them to leave the saloon by the front entrance, Osburn dealt him several terrific blows, and Dr. Stuart was called to patch up the injured man.
