COTTON DECLINES JUDGSHIP.

New Man Will Be Selected to Succeed Late Judge Bellinger.

William W. Cotton, commissioned by President Roosevelt for federal district judge in Oregon, has declined the appointment, and the several aspirants for the place, who sought the honor until it was awarded to Mr. Cotton nearly two months ago, find the course open for a new race.

The cause of Mr. Cotton's change of mind comes evidently from persuasions of high Harriman officials in New York, with whom he has been conferring. Mr. Cotton is general attorney for the O. R. & N. Co. He is looked upon as one of the ablest counsel in the service of the Harriman lines. The Eastern managers of that system tried to dissuade him from taking the appointment, and after he announced that he would accept the judgeship and take up its judicial duties September 1, they kept at him to decline, and at last brought him around to their wishes. Mr. Cotton had received the commission, but had not taken the judicial oath, and therefore was not yet in the office.

The salary of district judge is \$500 a month. As attorney for the O. R. & N., Mr. Cotton has been receiving \$1200 a month, and there is reason to believe that this compensation has been increased by the railroad officials at New York.

SUES FOR \$2000 DAMAGES.

H. P. Ridings Brings Action Against Marion County.

H. P. Ridings, who sometime ago commenced suit in the circuit court of Marion county for \$2000 damages against the county of Marion, has been granted a change of venue to the circuit court of Clackamas county, as Marion county is the defendant in the suit. Ridings swears that he sustained injuries on a county bridge, which crosses the Pudding river two miles east of Woodburn. Mr. Ridings rode across the bridge October 30 last, and his horse stepped in a hole in the planking, and he was thrown to the ground and permanently injured in the right arm.

Took Poison by Mistake.

Taking antiseptic tablets, thinking they were headache medicine, P. J. Fay, who resides at Eleventh and Madison streets, narrowly escaped death Monday night. The tablets were given him by one of his children, and the error was not realized until nearly too late, but prompt administration of antidotes by physicians saved his life, and he has fully recovered. Mr. Fay was suffering from a violent headache and took enough corrosive sublimate to kill half a dozen people.

SENATOR IS SENTENCED

Mitchell to Serve Six Months in Jail and Pay \$1000.

GOES TO SUPREME COURT

Another Chapter is Added to the Disgrace and Downfall of Oregon Official.

John H. Mitchell, Oregon's senior senator, has been sentenced to serve six months in the Multnomah county jail at Portland, and to pay a fine of \$1000. Execution of the sentence has been suspended, pending an appeal to the supreme court of the United States. In passing sentence, Judge Delhaven said:

"It will be sufficient to say that in reaching a conclusion as to the proper judgment to be given I have given consideration to the age of the defendant which may be properly taken into account in mitigation of punishment and to the fact that the offense is defined in the statute as a misdemeanor and not as a felony, and to the further fact that the legal effect of the judgment is to forever disqualify the defendant from holding any office under the Government of the United States. In view of this fact and considering also the nature of the defendant's offense, as disclosed by the evidence, the judgment of the court is that the defendant be imprisoned for the term of six months in the county jail of Multnomah County, and pay a fine in the sum of \$1000."

Account Settled by Fists.

George Walters and Sid Warren, employees of the paper mills, fought a good fight Wednesday night at the west end of the Suspension bridge, before a crowd of 150 people. There were probably 20 women in the throng. The two men had some difficulty in Canemah Park last Sunday. Warren got the worst end of it there, but he accosted Walters again Wednesday night. Notwithstanding his gamester Warren was the loser the second time. It is probable that the authorities will issue warrants for the arrest of both men.

Crowds at New Era Camp.

New Era Spiritualist Campmeeting is attracting large crowds, particularly at the Sunday meetings. Last Sunday National President Barrett, who is considered to be the ablest speaker that the Spiritualists have, was on the platform, and Harry J. Moore, a Spiritualist speaker from Chicago, also made a talk that was interesting. Many tents and campers are on the grounds and the hotel has been crowded several times since the meetings commenced. The Association has decided to extend the meetings a week, and they will close Sunday, August 6.

From San Diego by Mule Team.

Mr. and Mrs. J. Monroe Mark, of San Diego, Cal., have just arrived here to spend the Summer with relatives. Mr. and Mrs. Mark came all the way from home, a distance of 1900 miles, behind a team of mules, and they enjoyed the trip immensely. They left Southern California March 24, and came north leisurely, stopping at points of interest, passing through the Yosemite Valley, following the Sacramento river, crossing the mountains into Oregon. They will return by steamer.

Brush Fires on Canyon Creek.

Dee Wright, who came in from Liberal Wednesday, brought the news that a forest fire is raging at the head of Canyon Creek, in the foothills east of Wilhoit, in the vicinity of James. The fire is one-half mile in width and has thus far covered one mile in length, after having burned three days. It is supposed that the blaze had its origin in a camp fire on the

RIDINGS STEALS A HORSE.

Man Who Robbed George Ogle is Wanted in Eastern Oregon.

Harris Ridings, whose home is four miles from Marquam, is again wanted by the authorities, this time for stealing a horse from Morrow County. Ridings was arrested last Winter, charged with stealing a watch and other personal property from George Ogle. Shortly after the commission of the crime, Ogle was injured and

was not able to appear against Ridings for several months. Meanwhile Ridings languished in the county jail, and the matter was finally settled, as the prisoner had already served much time in jail, and in consideration of this fact, Mr. Ogle agreed not to prosecute further. Ridings went to Eastern Oregon, and while there stole a horse, which he has probably disposed of by trade. He came home and afterwards took a trip to Idaho, returning a short time ago.

Sheriff Shutt, of Heppner, came down here about a month ago, and notified Sheriff Shaver that he wanted the man, but instead of leaving the matter in the Clackamas County sheriff's hands, the Morrow County officer went to Marquam, and the information leaked out that Ridings was

wanted. The man became a fugitive, and Shutt left for home, leaving his warrant in the hands of Mr. Shaver, who bided his time, and learned a few days ago that his man was home. Tuesday night, accompanied by William Everhart, he drove to the Ridings place and arrived there early in the morning. He was told that his prey was sleeping in the house, and leaving Everhart to guard the doors, he searched the building thoroughly, but failed to find his man. Going to the barn, he discovered that Ridings had slept there all night, but had down while the house was being searched. Mr. Shaver spent several hours in the immediate vicinity, but was unsuccessful, but he will possess his soul in patience and will land Ridings in jail eventually.
