

MOLALLA'S FIRST FAIR

Successful Exhibition Was Free to All.

ENTRIES NUMBERED 500

Exhibit Was Varied, Showing Wonderful Resources From West Boundary to Table Rock.

MOLALLA, Or., Oct. 11.—(Special Correspondence of The Courier.)—Molalla has held its first fair and made it a grand success, notwithstanding the terrible weather we had to contend with, which goes to prove, after all, Molalla people, North, South, East and West, can be depended on in an extreme case of emergency. Those that were "too busy" to assist in any way, can also congratulate themselves that while they were enjoying peaceful slumbers, the faithful ones were "burning midnight oil" to drive the enterprise along. While it was a free fair for everybody, it paid running expenses from the sale of two quilts. Ralph Sawtell got Quilt No. 1 and James Dickey got Quilt No. 2.

The lower hall served as the pavilion, the upper hall as the art gallery, the schoolhouse as the auditorium and the horse shed was turned into stock pens. The high places on the ground, the "Trail," and the low places flanking the "Lake."

There were about 500 entries and many exhibits brought in at the "eleventh hour," after the judges of awards were out on the duties. The Yoder Brass Band furnished the greater part of the music, which was appreciated. Had the weather been favorable for a concentrated mass of humanity, "Portland Day" at the Lewis and Clark would have hardly been in it (everything considered). Many expressed themselves that the Molalla fair exceeded the Clackamas county exhibit in many respects.

The "Howard Bread Premium" was awarded to Mrs. E. T. B. Thomas first, and Mrs. Della Shaver second, for the best bread baked from Howard's flour.

In the juvenile department, for the three best apples, Ross Sawtell got the rifle and Pearl Harless the mending tools, awarded by J. W. Thomas, for the best display of fruit. The exhibit was a varied one, and showed the wonderful resources of the Molalla country from Table Rock to the country's western boundary.

ONLY \$14,000 REMAINS

Delinquent Taxroll Will Be Unusually Small This Year.

Sheriff John R. Shaver, tax collector for Clackamas county, said this week that out of a total tax roll of \$233,061.26, only about \$14,000 remained to be collected, and of this amount probably not more than \$12,000 would be listed as delinquent. Taxpayers have paid very promptly this year and the delinquent roll will be unusually small. The total tax roll includes the following items: County, state, road and school, \$192,036.88; special school, 19,931.78; Oregon City, \$9,111.78; pols., \$837.

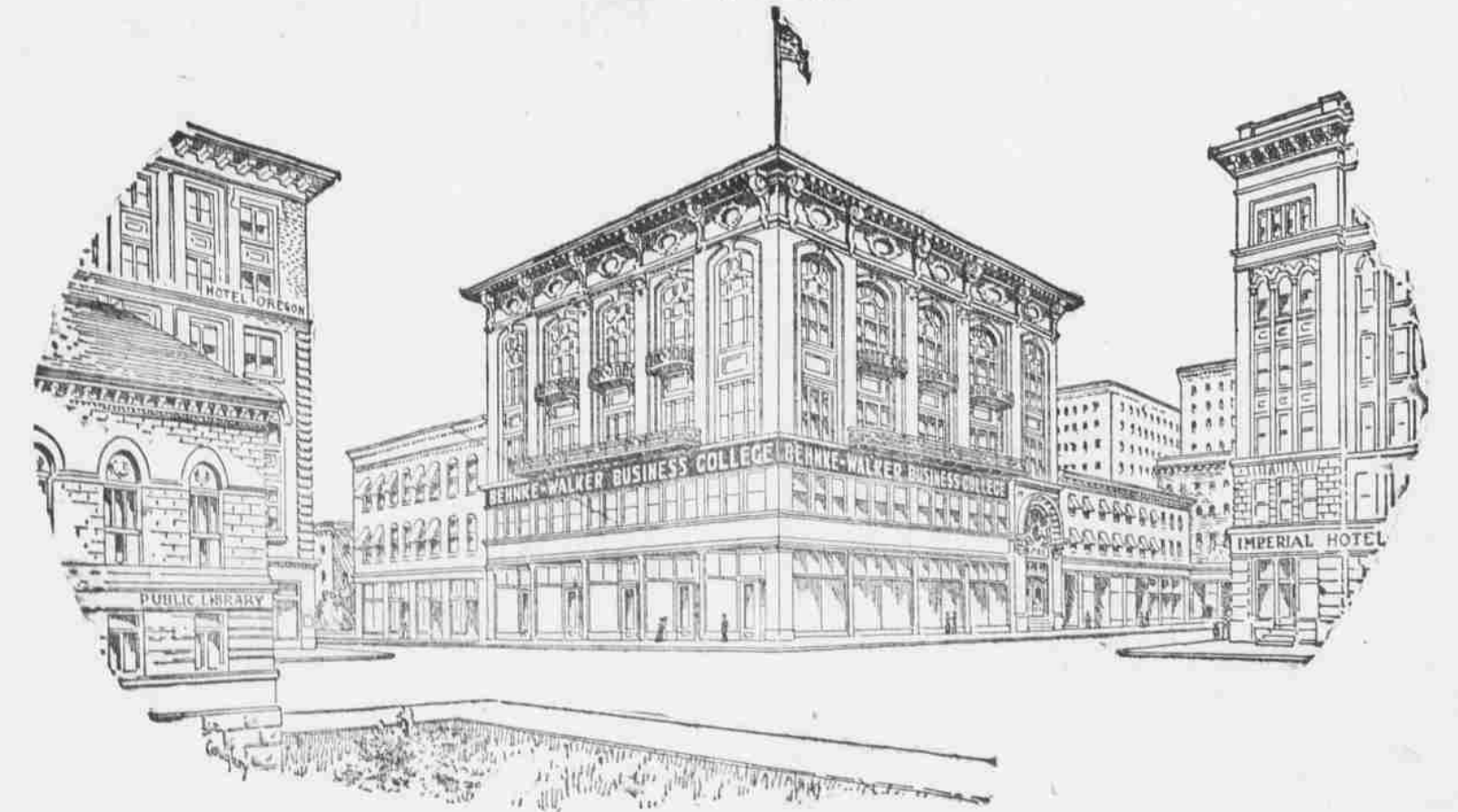
