PRIZES WON AT YAKIMA

Schmidt Brothers, of Shubel, Receive Awards.

FINE CATTLE AND SHEEP

Clackamas Breeders Make Remarkable Showing—Purchase Champion Bull "Valiant."

K. Schmidt arrived here Tuesday from Yakima, where he has been attending the Washington State Fair, where Schmidt Bros., of Shubel, exhibited Shorthorn cattle and Shropshire sheep. He has been away from home three weeks, and ten days of this time was spent at the Lewis and Clark Exposition, where Schmidt Bros. walked off with 14 awards. In Portland Mr. Schmidt exhibited two Shorthorn bulls and one heifer, and sold the bulls at the close of the fair, purchasing the fine bull, "Valiant," bred by Miner of Heppner. This animal was brought here this morning, and was taken to Shubel Tuesday with the rest of the stock. "Valiant" is well known among Oregon breeders, taking the junior grand champion prize at the state fair last year. At Yakima he won the first prize, the champion, and the grand champion for his class. The bull is two years old and weighs 2100 pounds. Mr. Schmidt sold his first prize buck lamb at the Lewis and Clark Exposition to Dr. James Withycombe, and it was taken to Corvallis for use in the Agricultural college experiment station. At Yakima he exhibited sheep, together with some sheep from R. Scott's farm at Milwaukie, and at Portland he purchased Ladd's champion ewe. Schmidt Bros. are firm believers in blooded stock, and are among the successful breeders of this county.

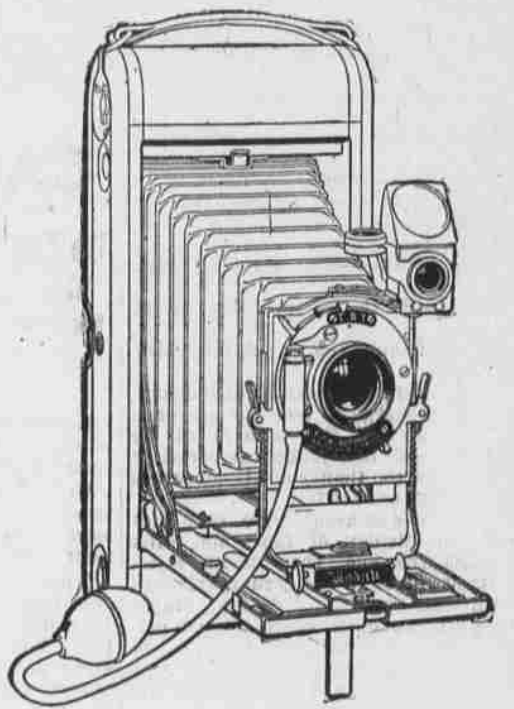

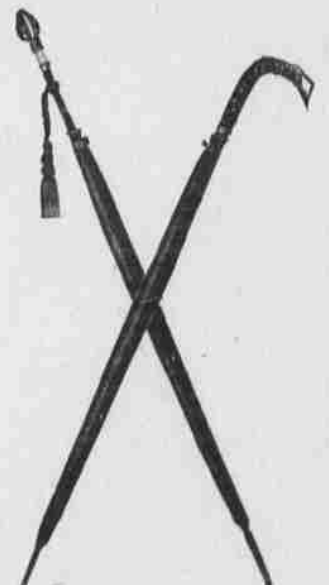
