**FIRST SMELTER IN COUNTY.**

Mines on Upper Clackamas Produce \$37.20 In Copper to Ton.

First smelter ever operated in Clackamas county has been set up, tried and tested at the Financial Mining Company's mines on the Upper Clackamas River, and the result is very gratifying to the promoters, who reside in this city. The melter has capacity of about 38 tons daily, and while a thorough test has not yet been made, results that have been obtained are entirely satisfactory.

The melter takes ore from the dump, and separates everything from the minerals, leaving ingots of gold, silver and copper. After having been crushed to the proper fineness, an average sample was taken to determine the values, and a large percentage of the ore from the mines are copper values, and an assay showed a percentage of copper of twelve and four-tenths, or \$37.20 to the ton.

Frank H. Welsh, an officer of the company, said that the melter would not be used this winter, but the crew of the mines would work on the tunnels, getting ore for the dump, and smelting operations would be resumed in the spring. Snow sheds for the protection of the melter will ill not be built this winter.

**Stolen Cart Recovered.**

Constable Harry Fremuth took a trip to Sunnyside yesterday and recovered a cart that had been stolen by a temporary resident of that place, who has hid away to parts unknown. The cart is the property of Mr. Hunter and was loaned by him to Joe Deardoff. The thief went to Mr. Deardoff with the tale that he had purchased the cart from Hunter, and hitching his horses to the vehicle, drove away. Mr. Deardoff took the action of the cart stealer in good faith until he discovered that the cart had been sold to another farmer and that the thief had never purchased it from Hunter.
