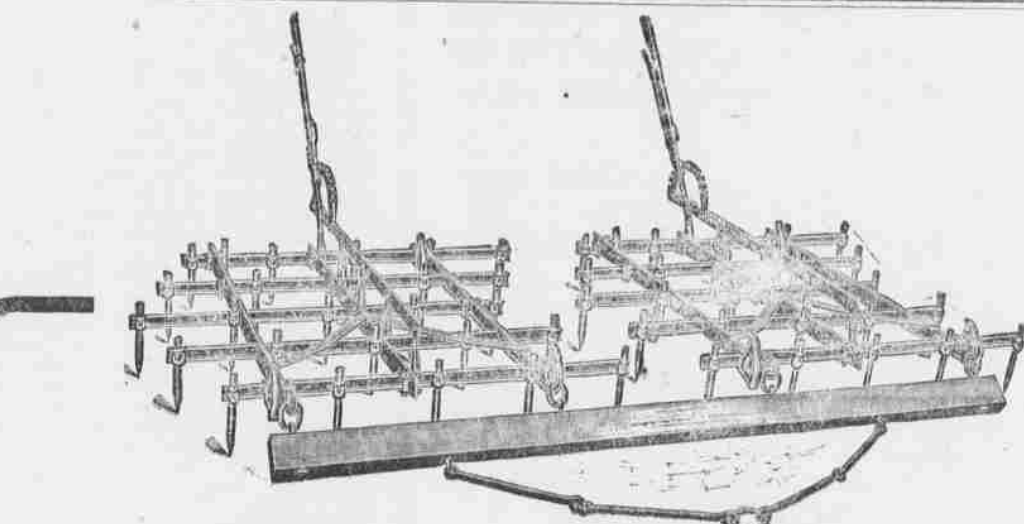

THE "CRITIC" ADJUSTABLE STEEL FRAME LEVER HARROW

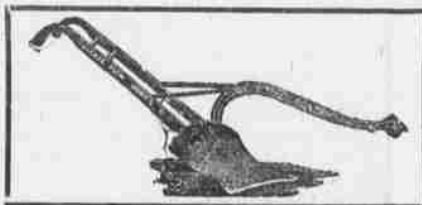
Has No Holes Through the Bars—Everything Is Clipped On

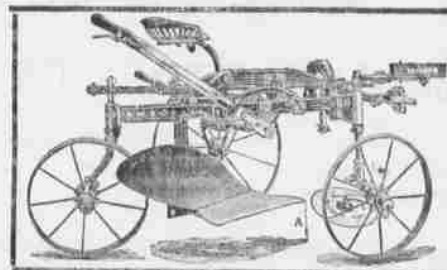
