CELEBRATE GOLDEN WEDDING.

Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Porter Married Fifty Years Ago.

The celebration of the golden wedding of Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Porter at Canemah Monday was a most happy event and the occasion for the gathering of many relatives and friends. After a bounteous wedding dinner, the guests, in turn, presented their golden gifts as tokens of love and esteem.

Ray W. Porter, who was born in Onida county, New York, Oct. 17, 1833, was married to Amanda M. Dey at the home of her parents in Erie county, Pennsylvania, Jan. 1, 1856. Mrs. Porter was born at the place of her marriage, Aug. 24, 1838. At the time of their marriage Mr. Porter was engaged in the transportation of crude oil from the well of L. E. Drake at Titusville, Pa., the first petroleum well ever discovered in that section. At the call of his country's needs, Mr. Porter was one of the first volunteers to be enrolled under the standard of the sad Pennsylvania Infantry for the years of service in support of the Union. During his absence, the none the less heroic duty of maintaining the family and the care of the three little ones devolved upon the young wife. Upon his return from the war Mr. Porter took up his trade of blacksmithing, continuing in this vocation until very recently.

Mr. and Mrs. Porter came to Oregon in 1878 and have lived here ever since. Nine children blessed their union, five of whom are still living: Charles E. Porter, of Baker City, Or.; Clarence W. Porter, of Fairbanks, Alaska; Mrs. A. C. Wallis, Mrs. J. B. Laher and Mrs. Robert Bakowsky, all of Portland.
