

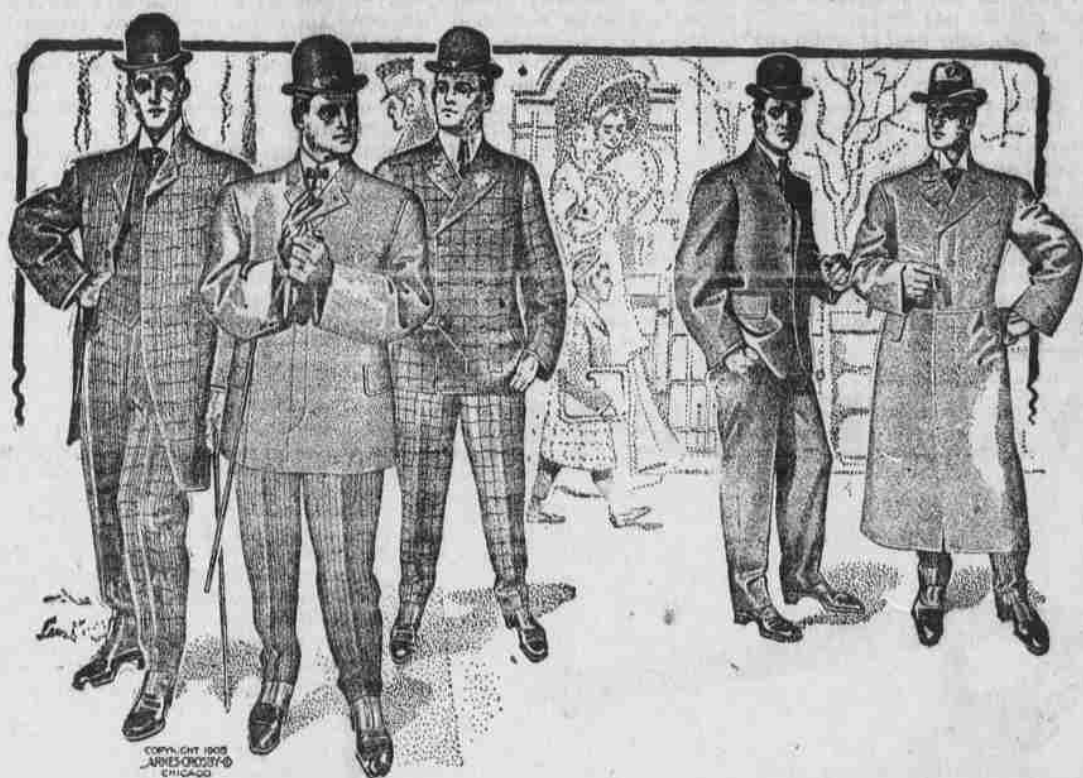

TICKET WILL BE STRAIGHT

Democrats Want Nothing Else For This Campaign.

BIG MEETING IS HELD HERE

Arrangements Are Made For a Banquet in Oregon City Thursday Evening, February 8.

Enthusiasm reigned Wednesday at the called meeting of the precinct committeemen and other war-horses of Clackamas County Democracy. The weather did not keep them at home, and followers were there from all parts of the county. Speeches were made by nearly all of them, hearty support of the ticket was pledged, and the organization decided to further the cause by giving a banquet in this city Thursday evening, February 8, at 8 o'clock. W. B. Stafford, J. E. Jack, J. H. McGlashan, H. F. Latourette and H. E. Draper were appointed a banquet committee, and they will meet next Monday evening to arrange details. Invitations for the affair will be issued next week, and each precinct committeeman has been constituted a committee of one to assist the general committee in the preparation of the spread.

One thing is certain, and that was clearly shown at the meeting—the Democrats will place a straight ticket in the field this year and will not be troubled with fusion or independents. N. F. Nelson, of Logan, urged the party to leave the head of the ticket vacant, and permit an independent man to run for state senator, but he was alone, and was the only man who voted against J. J. Cooke's motion that the sense of the meeting was to nominate a Democratic ticket from top to bottom. C. N. Wait, of Canby, said that the party had dozens of good men who would dignify the place, and the name of J. E. Heeges was greeted with loud applause.

The new primary law came in for its share of discussion, and knotty points were explained to the satisfaction of those present. The question of holding meetings in every precinct prior to the date of the primary election came up, and the matter was left to the committeemen to make investigations along the line of registration and precinct meetings and report at the banquet. The fifth degree was conferred upon a large class, and in the evening Pure Food Commissioner J. W. Bailey talked on the subject of pure food. A pleasing and instructive program was rendered. Governor Chamberlain was thanked by resolution for the appointment of State Lecturer Clara H. Waldo as regent of the Oregon Agricultural College. Mrs. Waldo was congratulated on her appointment.
