

BOLDNESS OF W. L. TOOZE

People of First Congressional District Amazed.

CLAIMS MARION COUNTY

Only a Very Insignificant Minority Supporting Candidate in His Home Place.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 25.—(Special Correspondence.)—People here are amazed at the boldness of Walter L. Tooze, candidate for congressman from the First district, in claiming great strength in Marion county. It is generally known among those who are close to the political situation here, that he will be fortunate if he gets one vote out of three in this county.

In order to ascertain the sentiment of Marion county, respecting his candidacy, a canvass was made a short time ago of men who had served Marion county in the state senate and lower house and who are still active in county politics.

Following are the names of those who were interviewed: The senators are:

Out of all these prominent Republicans, only four favored Tooze's candidacy. These four were L. J. Adams, J. G. Graham, A. M. LaFollett and E. Hofer.

Of this insignificant minority that is supporting Tooze, E. Hofer is the only man who is active in Tooze's campaign and Hofer is said to be a Republican just at present because he has an axe to grind. He is managing Tooze's campaign throughout the district, is a newspaper man and has arranged with a number of papers throughout the district for Tooze for advertising space. He was a Bryan elector in 1896, was afterwards a candidate on the Democratic ticket for the legislature, supported Bryan in 1900 and supported the Democratic state ticket in the last election.

It is commonly understood that he and Tooze organized the Willamette Development League for the purpose of boosting Tooze in his campaign for congressman.

It is generally understood in Salem that Tooze has contracted with The Statesman for advertising space to the value of \$400. The Statesman, which is the leading Republican paper in this county, is known to be bitterly opposed to Tooze's nomination. There is not a man connected with the paper who will support him in his present contest.

Had C. B. Moores remained in the congressional fight, he would have received the solid support of Marion county. Since his withdrawal the sentiment has been continually running stronger toward S. B. Huston, of Washington county.

W. C. Hawley, of Salem, is well spoken of and is generally well liked as a citizen, but many seem to think that he is not first-class congressional timber and that while he would be in earnest in his efforts on behalf of Western Oregon, that he would not be able to accomplish much as a congressman.

Tooze will not carry his own precinct. He is depending on securing a vote in parts of the district where he is comparatively unknown by liberal newspaper advertising.

This is the situation as near as I am able to get it, in Marion county. The campaign is becoming spirited and the tide seems now to be running strongly toward Huston.

APPLE-GROWING COUNTRY.

Leading Fruit Men Were Ready to Invest Heavily.

With the faith in Clackamas county's fertile soil that was backed by a willingness to invest money, Secretary Lamberson, of the State Horticultural Society, and Professor Lake of the Oregon Agricultural College, were prevented from purchasing 3000 acres of land near Colton only because the property was taken in by a Swedish colony at a higher figure than the horticultural men were ready to pay.

Professor Lake is probably the highest authority in the state on apple-growing, and with Mr. Lamberson, had selected Clackamas county as the best field for a large commercial orchard. They had studied the soil carefully and made a choice of Clackamas of all the counties in Oregon. Negotiations were entered into for the purchase of land near Colton, which is peculiarly adapted to raising apples, but before a deal could be closed, a colony of Swedes came into the field and offered to take over an immense tract of land, and closed a contract forthwith. County School Superintendent J. C. Zinner, secretary of the Clackamas County Horticultural Society, owns 180 acres of land near the acreage purchased for the colony.

Circuit Court.

In the suit of S. D. Barney vs. Pettit & Co., the demurrer of the defendant was overruled, and he was given until February 12, in which to file an answer.

Gaffney Suit in Court.

John Gaffney's suit against his two sons, Dan and Michael Gaffney, was taken under advisement in the circuit court Tuesday by Judge McBride. Gaffney is a wealthy farmer of Milwaukie and two years ago deeded to his sons 700 acres of land, valued at about \$14,000. Some time ago the father brought suit to set aside the deeds on the grounds that his sons caused him to become intoxicated, and fraudulently secured his signature to the deeds. Testimony was taken by a referee and argument was heard in the court Tuesday. Both young men have long been residents of Clackamas county and bear excellent reputations.

THE COUNTY'S DEAD.

Cornelius Bair.

Cornelius Bair, of Canby, one of the best known residents of Clackamas county, and for four years county commissioner, died Saturday at his home aged about 65 years. Some time ago she was stricken with paralysis, and was unconscious for a week before his death. Mr. Bair came here prior to 1860 with the Aurora colony. The funeral took place Monday and the interment was in the Zimmerman cemetery near Needy, where the wife of the deceased is buried. Mrs. Bair died several years ago and the body of the late Mr. Bair was laid to rest beside his wife. Mr. Bair, or Colonel Bair, as he was better known, is survived by four sons and one daughter.

William Robinson.

William Robinson died at the home of his son, William M. Robinson, in West Oregon City, Sunday, aged 78 years. His death was due to heart failure. Deceased was born in North Ireland and passed the greater part of his life near Toronto, Canada. He lived in Oregon City about five years. He is survived by a wife, three sons and five daughters. All of his children living at Toronto, Canada, except Francis C. Robinson, of Salt Lake City, and William M. Robinson, of West Oregon City.

Francis D. Tegar died at his home on the Sandy road Thursday after an illness of two weeks. His ailment was pneumonia, which he contracted while driving to Portland, in an open wagon. His funeral took place Sunday at 11 o'clock, from his late home.

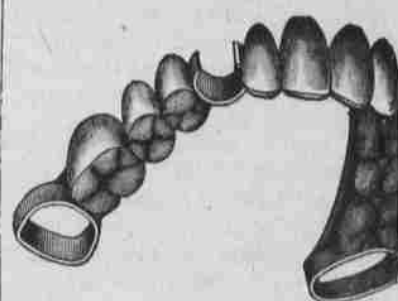
