Meissner, of Oregon City. Petitions have also been filed in several precincts by Democrats for the nomination of justice of the peace and constable.

### UREN HAS MUCH FAITH.

Believes That All Candidates Will Stand Firm for People's Choice.

W. S. U'ren last week returned from a trip in the Willamette Valley in the interests of State No. 1, of the direct primary nominating law. Mr. U'ren is spending much of his time away from home at the present time, and it is whispered that the interests of Jonathan Bourne, Jr., candidate for the United States Senate, are being helped along by a rigid support of State No. 1, of which measure Mr. Bourne advertises himself as champion. "I find that the statement is being generally signed," said Mr. U'ren, "in Clackamas, Yamhill and I believe in Benton counties, the candidates will be for the statement unanimously. In Salem they are signing several different kinds of statements, and there is a division in other counties. I am reasonably certain, however, that a majority of the members of the next legislature will be men who have signed Statement No. 1."

In reply to a question, Mr. U'ren said he had faith enough to believe that Republicans who had signed Statement No. 1 would vote for John M. Gearin for United States Senator, providing that Democrat received a larger number of the people's votes for United States Senator at the June election than any other candidate. "You may be sure," said he, "that those who are opposing Statement No. 1 will do all they can to secure votes for Gearin in June, in order to put the Republicans in the hole. I believe the successful candidates will keep their promise to vote for the candidate for United States Senator who receives the highest number of the people's votes at his party affiliation. I know there are people who do not believe this, and if it possible that such things can be, it is high time that all of us should know it."

### EMPLOYMENT FOR 50 MEN.

Plans for Removal of Planing Mill to Willamette Near Completion.

Plans will be completed in a few days for the reorganization of the Oregon City Planing Mill Company and a deal will be made that will add materially to the payroll of Oregon City. Arrangements are under way for the removal of the plant to Willamette, where advantages in the way of site, lights and power are to be obtained from the Willamette Falls Company, which has offered attractive inducements to the company. The capital stock has been increased, and all of the amount has been subscribed by local people. President William A. Huntley, of the Board of Trade, is a prime mover in the enterprise, and W. and B. Kuppenbender and John A. Moebske will retain large interests in the company. The plant will employ 50 men, when operated to its full capacity, and Willamette will have the finest equipped planing mill in the Northwest. A large dry kiln will be constructed. The first announcement of the negotiations for the promotion of the new company was made several weeks ago.

### AGITATE LOCAL OPTION.

Local Ministers Plan for Meeting with Laymen Next Monday.

At the local Ministerial Association Monday the fact that no one refers to the proposed amendment to the local option law was considered. It was decided to call a meeting of all the ministers with a representative layman from as many churches as possible in the county, next Monday afternoon. The place of this meeting will be announced later. The object of the meeting will be to get the real nature of the proposed amendment before the voters of the county.

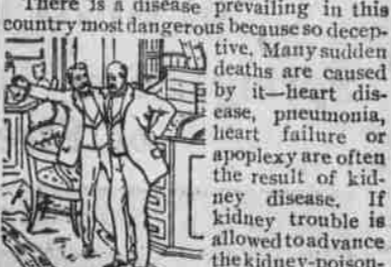

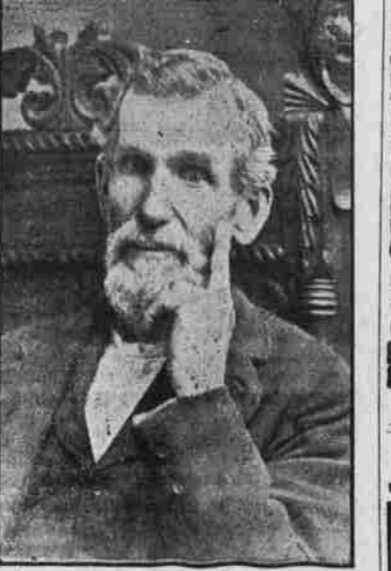
