Champion of Statement One

Jonathan Bourne, Jr., candidate before the Republican primaries for the nomination of United States Senator in Congress, for the long term commencing March 4, 1907, was born in New Bedford, Mass., February 23, 1855; was a member of the class of 1877 at Harvard University; came to Portland May 16, 1878; was a Republican member of the Oregon Legislature in the session of 1885 and the extra session of 1886; was one of Oregon's delegates to the Republican National Convention of 1888 and Oregon's member of the Republican National Committee from 1888 to 1892, and a delegate to the Republican National Convention of 1892; and was elected as a Mitchell Republican to the Oregon Legislature in 1896.

Mr. Bourne has been more prominently identified with the development of the mineral resources of Oregon than any other man in the State, having expended in the last 20 years over \$100,000 of his own money in the acquisition and development of Oregon mines.

While Mr. Bourne has had his residence and main office at Portland since 1878, he has had another office at New Bedford, Mass., and has carried on the business of his father's estate since 1889, which makes him familiar with many of the large interests and leading men in the East. These qualifications, in conjunction with his tremendous energy, originality, executive ability and experience in business and political affairs pre-eminently qualify him for making an able and influential Senator for the State of Oregon.

Mr. Bourne has always favored extending the direct power of the people over their government as far as possible. He was one of the leading spirits in the Initiative and Referendum movement from 1896 until it was approved by the voters at the June election in 1902. In 1904 he was a member of the executive committee of the Direct Primary Nominations League, and holds the same position with the People's Power League at this time. In all these movements he has been one of the few to guarantee the necessary expenses of preparing and proposing their measures to the people.

He says that the choice of United States Senator should be by direct vote of the people, and that the Legislature should be compelled to elect the man the people select. To accomplish this result, he is championing Statement No. 1, of the primary elections law as the only method by which public opinion may be crystallized and made effective upon the Legislature.

In his petition for nomination he says:

REPRESENTS HIS CONSTITUENTS.

Editor Cornwall Says Huntley Voted Against Pet Measure.

Rumors have been in circulation to the effect that Representative C. G. Huntley voted for the first slashing law at the last session of the legislature, but from an authentic source comes the information that Mr. Huntley registered his vote against this measure. No less a person than George M. Cornwall, editor of The Timberman, who was in Salem during the session up to the time the bill was passed and who was an active lobbyist for the bill, states that Mr. Huntley positively declined to vote for the bill.

"I endeavored to secure Mr. Huntley's support for our bill," said Mr. Cornwall, "and he was very frank in telling me that he had given our measure his earnest consideration and had written to a number of his constituents in Clackamas county, finding that the sentiment there was overwhelmingly against the measure. Mr. Huntley told me that he was in Salem representing the people of Clackamas county who elected him and the fact that a large majority of them opposed the bill was sufficient reason for his own opposition and he therefore would vote against it and did."

This statement, coming from such a source, only serves to prove the course taken by Representative Huntley

about 1000 members of the party from nearly all parts of the county. W. W. Myers, candidate for congress from the first district, was elected chairman, and Claude S. Howard, of Mulino, was secretary.

Nominations were made in the usual manner, with a printed ballot, containing the names of two candidates for each office, and the following ticket was placed in the field.

State Senator—William Beard, of Maple Lane

Representatives—Robert Ginther, of Beaver Creek; M. V. Thomas, of Cascades; F. J. Kraxberger, of Macksburg.

Judge—Charles E. Spence, of Beaver Creek.

Sheriff—Frank Matthews, of Macksburg.

Clerk—Charles E. Reynolds, of Maple Lane.

Recorder—J. V. Kauffman, of Needy.

Commissioner—Elijah Coalman, of Cascades.

Treasurer—Charles Moran, of Oregon City No. 3.

Surveyor—George Frye, of Oregon City.

Coroner—Geo. M. B. Jones, of Abernethy.

A resolution was adopted condemning the practice that had been employed by a few Socialists in registering a-Republicans in order to participate in the primary election of that party, as follows:

"Whereas, The Socialist party of Clackamas county, Oregon, believes that the primary law should have a fair trial, and the spirit thereof should be carried out and its privileges and benefits be extended to all parties; therefore be it

"Resolved, That the said Socialist party regard it as dishonorable and unlawful to register as or take part in the primary with another party than that with which he should affiliate from principle."

The action of the state officials of Idaho in the prosecution of the men charged with the murder of ex-Governor Steiensenberg, was denounced in the following language:

placed in power Douglas in Massachusetts; La Follette in Wisconsin; Folk in Missouri; Weaver in Pennsylvania and Jerome in New York are doing effective work in this state that cannot fail to have results in the June election.
