WHY BAKER RESIGNED.

Perhaps, because he saw the trend of public opinion, is the reason why Republican State Chairman Frank C. Baker deserted his ship in troubled waters. And then, perhaps the story currently going the rounds of his conversation with President Roosevelt is true. The story goes to the effect that the late chairman told the President that with the aid of the proper kind from Washington, he could carry Oregon in June for the entire Republican ticket and defeat Governor Chamberlain, as well as the rest of the Democratic candidates. The President is said to have replied:

"I have no very exalted opinion of the Oregon wing of the Republican party; I believe the re-election of Oregon's present governor will be a good thing for the people of your state, and that eventually it will not injure the Republican party in Oregon."

It is said that not even the 48,000 majority he received in the last national election in this state can make Mr. Roosevelt forget the slap in the face the Oregon Republicans gave him when they elected Binger Hermann to congress.

THEY DIE HARD.

The direct primary election law was intended as the solar plexus blow for the political bosses, and it will probably be their finish. But the bosses do not pass over into the elysian fields with any particular rush. The grafters display no frantic yearning for the quietude of the simple life. They leave the public crib with reluctance and die hard. Even Jonathan Bourne, Jr., who kidnapped the direct primary election law and palmed it off as his own child, has clung to the old method to such an extent that he has formulated a legislative slate in Multnomah county.

Speaking of Jonathan Bourne, Jr., whom his rivals sneeringly refer to as "a remittance-man-from-home," it may be pertinent to remark that he is placing a great deal of good money in circulation in making his campaign.

AN ENORMOUS RAKE-OFF.

The fact that at least three of the state officers in Oregon get stupendous "grants" or rake-offs, is just now becoming fully understood, digested and realized by the great mass of voters in Oregon. It has set them thinking. They perhaps harbor no hatred for the direct beneficiaries, but they do condemn the political party that has allowed the steal to exist and it is becoming apparent that they intend to vote down the regime that has encouraged "the graft and fattened on the spoils."

When the state printer, an officer that exists, like the curl in a pig's tail, for ornament only, received for his services more money than is paid in salary to the President of the United States, it is evident that there is "something rotten in the state of Denmark." The voters would like to know why the treasurer of Oregon should be paid more money in one year than the chief justice of the United States gets in three years. They are asking that a stop be put to the system that pays the secretary of state nearly as large an amount as the combined salaries of all the President's cabinet officers. Oregon's state printer gets more pay than the combined salaries of the United States ambassadors to Great Britain, Russia and Germany. The people are asking:

"Are we getting the worth of our money?"

"It is a noticeable fact that one of the Republican candidates supposed to be the leading one for state printer has studiously avoided saying that he favors putting that office on a flat salary."

STAGGERING UNDER A HEAVY LOAD.

With full due respect for whatever principles the national Republican party may have that are worthy of favorable consideration, the great bulk of voters of independent tendencies are saying that it is asking too much of a voter to solicit his ballot for the perpetration in power of any party of men who have made the record that has been enacted by the dominant party in Oregon. Lind frauds, both state and national, and the scandalous grafts in the offices of state printer, secretary of state and state treasurer combine with other disgraceful conditions to form a load that is too heavy for any political party to carry.

Party fealty is not strong enough to sustain the left of this burden.

FIRST EVIDENCE OF INSINCERITY

Another reason, perhaps stronger than any of these, is causing people who do their own thinking to turn their backs on the old machine Republicans. This is the evident insincerity of the Republican bosses and politicians in their advocacy of the plan to elect United States Senators by the direct vote of the people. It is true that some of their candidates for the legislature have signed "Statement No. 1" which pledges them to vote for the choice of the people for the senate; but the interpretation that Senator Fulton has placed on it means that they will consider their promise binding if a Republican is chosen and void if the people's choice happens to be a Democrat.

Senator Fulton, speaking from Washington, said: "No Republican member of the legislature would be expected to vote for a Democrat, no matter what pledge he may have signed." By reason of the fact that Senator Fulton is almost the only Republican federal official of any prominence in the entire state, who is not resting under the shadow of scandal and disgrace, he may well be considered the oracle and the mouthpiece of the most respectable element of his party.

The people of Oregon, in fact, the voters of the Nation, are weeded to the idea of electing senators by popular vote and pending the time when the constitution will be amended to permit of this, they will demand good faith on the part of state legislators in carrying out the provisions of the new primary law. In fact, the eyes of the entire country are centered on this state and thinking people everywhere are watching the result of the Oregon plan with interest. And it is believed that the election of John M. Gearin to the senate is highly probable.

House Bill 9, making it unlawful for legislators and other public officials to accept passes over railroads.

Representative Huntley at the session of 1903 strenuously opposed all the large appropriations, such as the Lewis and Clark Fair bill, carrying \$500,000 and the Dalles-Celilo railroad, carrying \$165,000. He was a member of the committee which reported on and put through the house the corporation tax law. This law is bringing in over \$100,000 each year to the state, and practically none of this money comes from the pocket of the farmer. As chairman of the house committee sent to inspect the State Portage railroad at The Dalles and to report on the advisability of making an additional appropriation, Mr. Huntley was chiefly instrumental in defeating the senate bill, carrying an appropriation of \$30,000 for the purpose of building the railroad into The Dalles. He voted against the Executive Mansion bill, carrying an appropriation of \$14,500 for an oil shell of a house and which would have cost the taxpayers at least \$10,000 per annum to maintain.

If nominated and elected, Mr. Huntley will vote for the Grange Tax law and will advocate and vote for the repeal of the present law for burning slashings; will advocate separate appropriation bills and will oppose and vote against more than two normal schools. He will vote for the people's choice for United States Senator.

have been torn from their homes in the disguise of law; and

"Whereas, They are imprisoned in Idaho, charged with complicity in the murder of ex-Governor Steunenberg, and circumstances point to the fact that they are innocent; therefore be it

"Resolved, That the Socialist party of Clackamas county, in convention assembled, denounce the attempt of the mine owners to break up this labor organization and send these men to the gallows, and we demand a fair and impartial trial."

The convention adopted the following platform:

"We hereby affirm the national and state platforms of the Socialist party. We favor the election of road supervisors by the people, regardless of politics, similar to the election of school directors.

"We further demand that the money which is collected for road taxes be expended in the same district where it is collected, with a reasonable deduction for bridge fund only.

"We demand the establishment of a government and county employment office, maintained by the county.

"We demand a correct statement of the financial condition of the county every three months."

PURE WATER HERE.

Dr. Watson Finds Filtered Product Free From Bacteria.

D. Robert C. Yenny, secretary of the state board of health, and state health officer, was in the city last week and obtained a sample of the water that is used in this city, and turned it over to Dr. Ralph C. Massey, assistant bacteriologist of the State Board of Health, for analysis. This water was secured after it had been taken from the Willamette river, and had passed through the filter. Dr. Massey has just reported that he finds the water entirely free from bacteria. The absence of typhoid fever in this city during the prevalence of that disease in the Willamette Valley during the past few months, is due entirely to the purity of the Oregon City water supply.

BELIEVES IN WOMAN'S SUFFRAGE.

J. A. Stall Says Political Atmosphere Would Be Purified.

SUNNYSIDE, April 5.—(Editor of The Courier).—As this is the proper time to make political speeches, and I have neither time nor the ability to deliver them, I beg leave to address my fellow citizens of Clackamas county, through the columns of your valuable paper. I live in Clackamas county three years; I am a horn-banded, hard-working farmer, and not a politician. I believe in the principles of progressive democracy, in local self-government, especially where the people are fit for it, and in the purity and honesty of such a government to Oregon City, Salem and Washington, and in the upbuilding and improvement of our social and political condition. I move to this county from St. Clair, Neb., on account of my health. I had been sunstruck and stunned by lightning back there, and could not stand the extreme heat or cold, and for another reason, I have a very large family and wish to make my future home in a country where from the least number of acres a family could make a home and living, thus insuring to my children a home. We are ever pleased with the climate, could scarcely wish to have it better. The land that is not worn out by forty to fifty years of annual robbing is very productive, and worn-out land responds very quickly to good treatment.

Our market is very good and will be much better in the near future, in fact, we have the world's market near our homes and are independent of the railroad trusts. The more of them that build to our harbors the better for us; they can never do us any harm. Portland, our commercial center, will become one of the largest cities of the world, with the completion of the Panama canal, caused by natural conditions. All this looks very bright and promising.

But now let us take a look at the political condition of our home county, of Clackamas. If I had to pay only twice as much taxes as I paid in Nebraska on the same amount of property, and if the money I pay would improve my main road, then I would not complain, but would call this county a paradise, and enthusiastically recommend it to my friends.

The social condition of Clackamas county and Oregon is certainly the standard with which states are like any other civil state ought to be entitled to such representation in congress that are worthy to be and in principles of the interest of the people.

ple. Candidates who have been in office and some new ones that wish for a trial have delivered speeches all over the county, telling the people of their needs and what they would do for them if elected, and telling of all the good they have done during the term of office. Now I hope the people of Clackamas county will not be ungrateful at the coming conventions and remember those old officers with a vote of thanks, and also decide themselves on the laws and reforms they need in order to red-empt themselves from serfdom and the county from bad reputation and demand a pledge from our candidate in support of the resolutions, and nominate candidates whose honor to a pledge could not be questioned. We have now a monarchical system of county government. We are free to elect our despot and our administration is good or bad according to the good will and sense of justice of our despot. Of course we have to blame the people for our present system and for patiently maintaining it. But for the unequal taxation and the unequal distribution of justice, I blame individual officers, of whom I will speak later on. Since the men take such little interest in politics here, some toll me and believe there is no use in voting—that they are plain disgusted with politics. Now then, as the men have rather made a botch of it, I would propose among the many reforms needed, the first one to be woman's suffrage. I have lived in a state where the woman had equal rights and the political atmosphere was a whole lot purer than here. And here in Oregon the boys are used at home to clear the farms and have, as a rule, not the advantage for reading and education as their sisters. Give the women the right to vote. Old maids are just as good as bachelors.

JOHN HEINRICH FOUND.

Clackamas Farmer Discovered Enroute to Dayton.

John Heinrich has been found and the fears of his family for his safety have been allayed. Heinrich, according to information received here Saturday, left Portland Friday on the O. R. & N., purchasing a ticket for Dayton, Wash. When a short distance out of Portland he was seized with a fit, behaving in a demented manner, laboring under the delusion that his room was next door and that he wished to go to bed. When the train arrived at Umatilla, the conductor placed him in charge of the conductor of the new division with instructions to transfer him at Wallula and Walla Walla for Dayton.

Heinrich is a resident of Clackamas Station, his farm being two miles east of that place on the Clackamas river, and he disappeared from home Tuesday March 20. Several days prior to that time he had been out of his mind, and his relatives watched him closely as he said he was going to kill himself. He eluded their vigilance, and succeeded in making his escape, and was seen the same day on the road to Damascus by Joe Bachman. Fifty dollars reward was offered by his family for information as to his whereabouts.
