

\$50,000 INCREASE

PAPER MILLS RAISE WAGES

500 MEN ARE BENEFITED

Willamette Pulp & Paper Co.
and Crown Columbia Pulp
& Paper Co., Act

Wednesday afternoon at four o'clock, while the mills of the Willamette Pulp & Paper Company and the Crown-Columbia Pulp & Paper Company were running full blast, an increase in wages was made, which will increase the yearly pay-roll in Oregon City at least \$50,000. All employees who have been receiving \$1.75 per day were raised to \$2 and all \$2 men were raised to \$2.25. Five hundred men are affected by the increase.

This action has been under consideration for the past two months. Early in April General Manager N. R. Lang went to San Francisco and took up the matter with the officers of the company there, when the earthquake and fire destroyed the company's offices and threw everything in an uproar.

Last Sunday morning, while Mr. Lang was absent on business at Lebanon, between 30 and 40 of the men in the machine rooms struck for an increase of 25 cents per day, but were dissuaded from walking out by Machine Boss Ed Sheehan, and they continued to work until Monday night when they walked out. Mr. Lang returned home Tuesday night and Wednesday morning a committee of ten of the strikers called on him, but he refused to treat with them. He told them they could go back to work and he would then confer with them as employees, but he absolutely declined to take up the proposition with men who had walked out of the plant during the absence of the manager. The men acknowledged that they had made a mistake, but said that they were not aware that Mr. Lang was absent from the city when they struck. Seeing the matter in its true light, the committee secured the presence of the remainder of the strikers and started up the three machines that were idle.

CHAMBERLAIN AT CANBY.

Talks to An Enthusiastic Audience of Voters From All Parties.

Governor George E. Chamberlain was honored by being greeted with the largest attendance seen at a political meeting during this campaign at Canby Thursday afternoon. Farmers were there from Macksburg, Marks Prairie, Needy, Barlow, New Era, and other nearby towns, all eager to extend the hand of welcome to the chief executive of the state. The main hall at Canby was full of people, and close to 300 of them listened to the Governor's speech. Charles N. Wait, nominee for representative, presided at the meeting, and introduced the speaker.

Every time the governor would pause in his remarks, he was enthusiastically cheered and applauded. He was frequently interrupted by popular expressions of approval.

The governor stole a march on the local committee here, and instead of coming up from Portland at noon and driving to Canby, as had been arranged, he did not stop in Portland at all, but leaving the O. R. & N. train which brought him from The Dalles, where he talked Wednesday night, the governor stepped aboard the Southern Pacific train and was taken direct to Canby where he obtained some much needed rest before the meeting. John J. Cooke, chairman of the county central committee; J. E. Hedges, nominee for state senator; R. B. Beatie, candidate for sheriff, and Wallace Cole, drove to Canby at noon to hear the governor and accompanied him upon his return to Oregon City on last Thursday's train.

Governor Chamberlain told the people at Canby that he had carried out the promises he had made four years ago, and related specific instances. He told them how he had succeeded in locating out the accumulated irredeemable school fund of \$750,000, and how he had prevented the state legislature from passing appropriation bills with the emergency clause at-

tached, so that the privilege of the people in exercising the referendum might be upheld. At the conclusion of the meeting, people crowded around the governor and shook his hand and many Republicans assured him that he would carry Canby beyond a doubt.
