MUTILATED POSTERS.

Mr. Malarkey Comes Into Contact With a Brownell Promise.

"Mr. Malarkey is author of the labor bill that reduced the hours of the employees of the railroads."

This was the surprising statement that was torn off the bottom of the posters that Mr. Dan J. Malarkey, of Portland, held in Shively's Opera House Saturday. The man who wrote the copy for the posters had evidently become confused or perhaps his ignorance led to a statement that was later found to be incorrect, as no such bill was enacted. The sight of a placard on a telephone pole, showing conclusively that a line had been roughly torn from the bottom of the sheet, led The Courier to make an investigation of the reason for the mutilation.

Mr. Malarkey came up from Portland Thursday night to listen to the speech of Governor Chamberlain, who addressed nearly 500 people, and had by far the largest political meeting that has been held in Clackamas County since the opening of the campaign. When Dr. Withycombe was here several years ago, the attendance was 118, though the precincts embraced in Oregon City and immediate vicinity are nominally three to one Republican. He heard the Governor's thunder and the next morning was billed to talk in Oregon City.

Geo. C. Brownell, candidate for state senator, who has held the office 13 consecutive years, has always claimed the credit for the introduction of any and all labor bills, and it is probable that he got wind of the contents of Malarkey's posters and sounded a cry of alarm. The laboring men of Clackamas are generally opposed to Brownell, who has been profuse in his promises but who has accomplished nothing for the laboring men of Oregon City.
