TURNED DOWN
BY BIG BOSS

Double Cross Given to Greaves and Harkenrider.

EXPLANATIONS IN ORDER

East Clackamas Voters Were Betrayed by Geo. C. Brownell at the Primary Election.

ESTACADA, Or., May 29.—(Special Correspondence.)—Geo. C. Brownell, who is not satisfied with a 19-year career of graft as state senator from Clackamas county, has sent word to Estacada that the farming districts are hitting him hard and that the towns must roll up big majorities for him or he is a goner. But the "boys" who handed Geo. C. a handsome vote in the primary election want something explained to them. Otherwise they will sharpen the long knife and on June 4th next Mr. Brownell will reap the fruits of his double dealing.

In the first place Estacada wanted Harkenrider for county commissioner. Mr. Brownell's workers here explained very plausibly how he was boss and how Mr. Harkenrider could not be commissioner unless Mr. Brownell's consent was first obtained. When Mr. Brownell's consent to Harkenrider for commissioner went out, of course that was supposed to mean that Brownell's organization of precinct workers were to have the tip from headquarters to "get in" for Harkenrider. Mr. Harkenrider himself had no hand in the arrangement, but his friends fixed it up, and the upshot of the deal was that Brownell did nothing for Harkenrider, but Harkenrider's friends gave Brownell a handsome vote. Now, unless there is some "fixing up," Estacada will "even up" by voting for J. E. Hedges, Brownell's opponent.

It was part of the understanding that "Dick" Greaves was to have the Brownell support for sheriff, and a large majority of the Estacada votes went for Greaves. Greaves' friends did the fair thing with Harkenrider, this appearing plainly in the vote in

Tualatin precinct where Harkenrider, though unacquainted, got 31 votes, exactly the same number as Greaves, while his four opponents received altogether but 12 votes. Greaves has worked for years in the paper mills at Oregon City and he was considered the labor candidate. Brownell pretended to be in favor of labor having representation on the ticket. He holds himself out as a great sympathizer and friend of labor. So Greaves' friends expected their candidate to get a good vote in the precincts that were Brownell strongholds. But when the votes were counted the result showed up as follows: Barlow—Brownell 24, Greaves 1; Beaver Creek—Brownell 53, Greaves 3; Cascades—Brownell 40, Greaves 2; Canby—Brownell 75, Greaves 1; and so on throughout the precincts where Brownell received a heavy vote. In spite of Brownell's perfidy and bad faith, however, Greaves got a splendid vote and was beaten by only a little over 300. Here in Estacada there are many workmen and they are beginning to realize that Brownell's friendship extends only to getting their votes for himself. He has here a number of paid workers and they are making a diligent effort to fix things up, but they are right up against the well known fact that Brownell threw both Harkenrider and Greaves down.

It appears that the bitter feeling is not confined to Brownell. Those seeking county offices who are known to be allied with him in his crooked work will come in for their share of scratches on election day. The Bourne-Brownell combination will cost Bourne many votes. In fact Bourne is being looked upon as about the same sort of a stick as Brownell—merely a political adventurer hungry for office. John Gearin for United States Senator and George E. Chamberlain for Governor are favorites with many Republicans. For county officials, "Bob" Beattie is the favorite with all parties for sheriff and J. E. Hedges for state senator will get the big vote that "has it in" for Brownell, in addition to the strong vote he will poll on account of his personal popularity and his well known integrity and acknowledged ability.
