

MASTER OF THE GRANGE.



A. Buxton.

A "man-of-the-grange" man of whom the Oregon Patrons of Husbandry are very proud is Austin T. Buxton. He was elected master of the Oregon State Grange at Albany and has entered upon the discharge of his official duties. Mr. Buxton was born near Forest Grove in 1873 on the farm where he now resides, and is just one year older than the State Grange in Oregon. He was a student of the Pacific University, and is a graduate of the Oregon Agricultural College at Corvallis. His membership in the Grange dates back to 1894, since which time he has held all of the subordinate offices and was for one term assistant steward of the State Grange. For two terms he was state lecturer, and for the past two years has been a member of the executive committee. He was married in 1896 to Miss Orla Robbins, of Clackamas county, and has two children who are growing up in the Grange.

Mr. and Mrs. Buxton will be Oregon's sole representatives in the National Grange during his term of office, and his position makes him a regent of the Agricultural College.

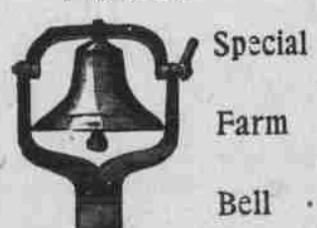

New County Judge



GRANT B. DIMICK

Grant B. Dimick, who will preside over the affairs of Clackamas county for the next four years, is a native Oregonian and was born on a farm east of Hubbard, March 4, 1869. After attending the public schools, Mr. Minville College and the Monmouth Normal, he studied law and was admitted to the bar June 1, 1894. He located at Oregon City the following year, serving as Deputy District Attorney for Clackamas county three years. In 1899 he was elected Mayor and served in that office for four consecutive terms, defeating three of the most prominent residents of the city, who opposed him for the place. He was elected for the fourth term without opposition and declined to serve the fifth year. Mr. Dimick was one of the Republican presidential electors from this state in 1904.

Four years ago Mr. Dimick was a leading candidate for the Republican nomination of County Judge, but withdrew just before the convention in the interest of party harmony. When Judge Ryan's second term was about to expire, Mr. Dimick announced his candidacy for the position and was nominated by an overwhelming vote over Richard Scott, of Milwaukie. He was elected County Judge last Monday over Harvey G. Starkweather by about 500 votes.

Under his administration he promises economy, efficiency and good roads, in which endeavors he will have the support of the people of Clackamas county.

GRADUATION AT WILLAMETTE.

Four Students Receive Diplomas From County Superintendent.

The graduating exercises of the Willamette school took place Wednesday night in the schoolroom, and diplomas were presented by County Superintendent of Schools J. C. Zinser to Raymond Olsen, Morieta Hickman, Jessie Buckles and Mabel Smith. An address was delivered to the class by Rev. R. C. Blackwell, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church, and Miss Nellie Swafford executed a piano number. Miss Mary Adele Case and Miss Morse rendered vocal selections.

The program was also made up with recitations by Jessie Buckles, Morieta Hickman and Arline Snyder, an essay by Raymond Olsen and a piano solo by Arline Olsen. The attendance from Willamette and Oregon City was large and the hall was tastefully decorated for the occasion.
