SMITH SHOT A SHERIFF.

Desperado Committed Desperate Crime in Wisconsin.

There prevails an opinion among some people that Frank Smith, the outlaw and triple murderer, who was shot to death by a posse at New Era a few weeks ago, may have been a noted Wisconsin desperado. Since the identity of the murderer of Sheriff Shaver, Police Officer Hanlon, of this city, and Captain Henderson, of Woodburn, has never been established, the following paragraph taken from the Independence Enterprise, is of interest to Oregon City people:

"Frank Smith, the outlaw, who recently killed an officer of the law in Oregon City and two in Woodburn, and was himself killed by a posse near New Era, is probably the same desperado who killed Harry Harris, a deputy sheriff of St. Croix county, Wisconsin, two years ago. A picture of the dead outlaw was sent by Henry Constance back to his old home, and a deputy sheriff of St. Croix county is of the opinion that he is the same desperado that gave that county trouble. While Smith was in Wisconsin, Sheriff Harris received instructions from the officers of Montana to look out for a man answering Smith's description, wanted for killing a marshal of a Montana town. Sheriff Harris found Smith on a train. After sitting beside him and engaging the suspect in conversation until convinced that he was the man wanted, the sheriff undertook to arrest Smith and was shot. Smith made his escape and was afterward surrounded by a posse, but through the aid of a sister made a second gateway and was not heard of again until his escape in Oregon."

City Council.

The city council held its monthly meeting Wednesday and re-elected Water Commissioner J. E. Hedges for a second term.

The petition to open Eleventh and Twelfth streets from Van Buren to Harrison street was referred to the street committee, and the petition of the Oregon City Planing Mill Company to place a switch from the Oregon Water Power & Railway Company's tracks to the new planing mill was granted.

The proposed Washington street improvement received its quietus, as the committee on streets and public property reported that the remonstrance against the improvement was greater than the petition for it.

The old gravel pit on the Logans and Albright property was secured for a garbage dump, at a monthly rental of \$5.

The ordinance making it compulsory to number houses was read first time.
