LIVELY TIME AT PARKPLACE.

Captain Smith Succeeds W. R. U'Ren as Director.

The annual school meeting at Park-place Monday night resulted in the election of Captain Smith as director to succeed W. R. U'Ren. The vote was about 2 to 1. The meeting was the scene of stormy times. Clerk Holmes was re-elected, and a fight ensued over the proposition to vote a special tax. Last year the district levied an 8-mill tax and supported a four-grade high school, but Monday night this tax was reduced to 5 mills.

Whether this tax will raise an amount sufficient to support the high school remains to be seen.

The annual meeting at Willamette Monday night was well attended, 63 voters being present. R. A. Junker was re-elected director for three years, and Ernest Mass was elected for one year to fill a vacancy. Otto F. Olsen was re-elected clerk. An additional room will be fitted up at Willamette, which will necessitate the employment of another teacher.

TROUBLES COME THICK.

Fred Blum Wants Damages For Sheep Killed By Dog.

Suit has been commenced by Fred Blum against Henry Barr and John Kaufman, who are charged with killing the owners of two dogs, who killed five sheep and six lambs, and wounded and injured 16 sheep to the value of \$16. He says that the sheep were worth \$5 each and the lambs \$1 each, and asks for judgment for \$47 and costs.

The Commercial Bank has instituted suit against J. M. McElhany and W. W. Bradley to recover money loaned on promissory notes and \$32 attorney's fees. The complaint states that December 26, 1905, the defendants borrowed \$190, giving their note for 30 days, and on Feb. 3, 1906, secured a loan of \$142.50, giving a 90-day note to the plaintiff.

Homer Mullan has sued S. B. Hartman for a sum of money alleged to be due for services in taking care of the defendant's horse. He states that January 10, 1906 the horse was committed to his care by one J. McCann, and the defendant agreed to pay \$1 per day for the care of the animal, and also the expenses and the reasonable value of any attention the horse might require from a veterinary surgeon. The animal was taken sick and Mullen paid out \$6 to a veterinary. He asks that he be paid for the care of the horse to date in the amount of \$118 and also during the pendency of the suit and that the horse be sold and the money turned over to the plaintiff.
