DROWNED IN WILLAMETTE. Clinton Hargrove Falls From Tramway Into the River. Clinton Hargrove was drowned at 6 o'clock Tuesday evening by falling from a tramway into the Willamette river. Hargrove was 26 years of age and Tuesday morning went to work for the Willamette Pulp & Paper Company. He was put to work wheeling slabwood across an elevated platform over the river basin. While he was working late Tuesday afternoon his truck became entangled in a rope and he was thrown into the water. His fellow workmen were unable to assist in his recovery, and he was drowned in plain sight of them. The body was recovered Tuesday and was taken to Coroner R. L. Holman's undertaking parlors, where an inquest was held Wednesday afternoon. Hargrove is survived by a wife and two children, who reside in this city. The family came here about six months ago from Pendleton, where Hargrove's father and mother live. Mrs. Hargrove's people live in the East.
