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CHAUTAUQUA.

The Oregon City Chautauqua, July 10-22, announces a splendid program for this year. Poets, authors, musicians, athletes, teachers, artists, men of science and men of skill are to be there—professional entertainers, famous lecturers, singers of renown and story-tellers, both men and women. Captain Jack Crawford, the poet-scout, has a national reputation; Leon Harrison is the most popular Jewish rabbi in America; Martha Gielow has made a fortune with her "Old Plantation Songs and Stories"; Miss Belle Kearney is called the greatest woman orator ever produced by the South; Professor Baumgardt has the knack of making astronomy popular, and Mark Beal is a reader and impersonator said to be the peer of any in America. The musical program will also be exceptionally good. It includes leading soloists of the state and a chorus of one hundred and twenty-one instrumentalists in Hayden's oratorio, "The Creation," on Saturday, July 14, and a second great evening of oratorio from Mendelssohn on Saturday, July 21, all under the direction of Prof. W. Gifford Nash—Eugene Guard.

The one discouraging feature about this institution is the fact that its patronage comes, to a such a large extent, from localities outside Clackamas county. A splendid treat of world-renowned talent is brought to our very doors and practically all of the young people of Clackamas county should be permitted to enjoy these two weeks of recreation, pleasure and instruction. From such an outing will come the conception of high ideals and in many a young heart will be kindled an ambition that will ripen into praiseworthy achievement. Let this be realized in the farm home. SIGNS POINT TO BRYAN.

Theodore Roosevelt has won great popularity in the advocacy of the precepts and principles of which William Jennings Bryan has long been the leading exponent. The application of these principles to our National Government is the hope of the hour and the people no doubt realize that Roosevelt has received much of the credit that is really Bryan's due. Mr. Roosevelt long ago declared himself out of the Presidential fight. To seek re-election, he indicated in his announcement, would be a breach of the spirit, at least, of Washington's doctrine that no President should serve more than two consecutive terms. Mr. Roosevelt, at the end of his present term, will have served as President practically eight years. He will undoubtedly live up to the principal to which he subscribed immediately after his election and decline to become a candidate for re-nomination.

Will the people honor Bryan by a nomination and election to the Presidency in acknowledgement of the service he has done for the Country? All signs point that way. As a people we always ready to recognize merit, ability and service and this American spirit almost assures William Jennings Bryan the highest place in the gift of the people.

PRACTICAL VACATIONS.

Many young people have returned from colleges and seminaries to spend the summer vacation beneath the parental roof. This is an opportune time to remind these that they should not neglect to learn a little of life's practical side and that they should not miss an opportunity that offers employment along the lines of practical business life.

The young man just out of college is, as a rule, pitifully helpless. He knows astronomy and analytics, but nothing concerning the ordinary means of gaining a livelihood. Out of the college atmosphere he has to spend several years acquainting himself to the "habits of every-day life." He comes from associates without set purpose among those who are pressing forward with definite objects in view. If, in school days, he has dreamed of achieving something in a general way, when he comes into the realm of business activity he realizes the need of a knowledge of detail and he finds himself unable to compete, in mercantile pursuits for example, with the wary, self-confident fellow who has been reared behind the counter; in professional life with the "cub" who started in as an errand boy, or with the man of any calling whatsoever who has mastered the rudiments of his business in boyhood.

Learning, of itself, is a pleasant acquisition but when it is sought for the service it may be to one in life, and the manner of its application must not be lost sight of. If the young men and women home on vacation will give their attention to practical things they will return to college in the Fall with a better understanding of the manner in which the learning they acquire is to be applied.

COUNTY COURT

Be it remembered: That at a regular term of the County Court of Clackamas County, held in the Court House in Oregon City for the purpose of transacting county business in June, the same being the time fixed by law for holding a regular term of said court, present, Hon. Thos. F. Ryan, county judge, presiding; T. B. Killin and William Brobst, commissioners, when the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

In the matter of claims examined and allowed:
In the matter of application of W. S. Flinn for a saloon license in Pleasant Hill precinct. A remonstrance having been filed in this matter, it is ordered that said application be denied.

In the matter of the petition to improve the Straus road leading from Cottrell to Boring. A subscription in the sum of \$120 having been filed, it is ordered that said subscription be accepted and petitioners allowed one thousand pounds of powder.

In the matter of petition of A. Koellmeier and others for a county road. Ordered that board of county road viewers meet at the place of beginning on June 25, 1906.

In the matter of petition K. Koellmeier for a county road. Ordered that board of county road viewers meet at the place of beginning on the 26th day of June 1906.

In the matter of additional aid for support of W. T. Tinsley, county charge. Ordered that allowance be increased to \$10.00 per month.

In the matter of subscription and petition of C. B. Johnson and others for improvement of county road. Ordered that petition be granted on condition that entire amount of subscription be worked out on the Kelley and Bradley road, and that the county furnish petitioners with one thousand pounds of powder.

In the matter of additional powder for opening Henderson road. Ordered that 150 pounds of powder additional be allowed for purpose of opening said road.

In the matter of the disposal of the old Gates rock crusher, ordered that said crusher be sold to the Warren Construction Company for cash price of \$250, they to take the crusher

from McCord hill and remove same at their expense.

In the matter of petition of Portland General Electric Co., for franchise for transmission of electric power from Cazadero to Maltomah county line. Ordered that same be granted subject to conditions made by the county court.

In the matter of purchase of new rock crusher. Ordered that the offer of Beal & Co. to furnish the crusher, screen and elevator for \$1955 be accepted.

In the matter of letting the contract for building bridge across Sucker Creek at Oswego, ordered that the bid of C. F. Royal & Son for construction of 80 foot, covered Howe Truss Bridge for \$1281 and approaches to same for \$2.10 per foot, be accepted.

In the matter of painting Suspension Bridge. Ordered that the clerk post notices asking that bids be submitted to furnish necessary materials to cover said bridge with two coats of paint, also bids to furnish necessary labor for painting bridge two coats of paint on or before June 18, 1906.

In the matter of inspection of certain changes and improvements on certain roads, ordered that the court meet on June 18, going on that day to inspect roads in Logan and Viola districts; on June 19 to inspect roads in Boring and Damascus, and June 30 to inspect roads in Barlow, Killin, Marquam and Molalla districts.

In the matter of report of Bruce C. Curry relative to books and accounts of Sheriff Shaver, deceased. Ordered that said report be accepted and filed and accounts of said sheriff be considered and deemed correct and settled.

In the matter of vacation of streets in Boring Junction. Affidavits of posting notice not having been filed, it is ordered that this matter be continued.

In the matter of the Fellows and the William Daniels roads. Ordered that action on these roads be continued until the July term, in order that Mr. Bauman and Mr. Daniels may appear and show cause why the recommendations of viewers, that the petitioners should pay the cost of laying out and establishment of said roads, or that same should not be denied.

In the matter of the change in the grade of Beeson Hill road. Ordered that offer of William Jones and Ada Moehnke be accepted and that the report of J. W. Meldrum, be approved, and clerk is hereby directed to have deeds from said William Jones and Ada Moehnke recorded and that bill of J. W. Meldrum be paid.

In the matter of application of employees of county working on the rock crusher for increase of wages. Ordered that this matter be laid over until next meeting of court.

In the matter of petition and subscription for improvement of Smith and Davies road from Carus to Phelps place. Ordered that subscription be accepted and that Adam Knight be introduced to work out same, and when said work has been performed, that the county assist in building bridge or in making fill over branch of creek.

In the matter of the petition of the Cascade Power Company for privilege to place poles on certain roads to convey electrical power. Ordered that same be allowed, subject to regulations heretofore adopted by Court.

In the matter of iron in old bridge at Sucker Creek. Ordered that offer of Royal & Son for \$16.50 per ton for said iron be accepted, on condition in addition to said price, contractor agree to take and pile up the timber in bridge for use and benefit of county, and that they be allowed the use as much of same as needed for false work.

In the matter of report of county Judge of receipts and expenditures and sales in connection with county exhibit at Lewis and Clark Fair. Ordered that same be approved and filed with the clerk, and that the committee receive the thanks of the court for good and satisfactory work.

In the matter of unclaimed county warrants. Ordered that the clerk advertise same in manner provided by law.

In the matter of purchase of crushed rock from Maltomah County for improvement of roads in district No. 37. Ordered that Mr. Kruse be instructed to purchase same at seventy cents per yard.

In the matter of the claims for fees, horse hire, railroad fare, meals and lodgings of citizens incurred in hunting down murderer Frank Smith. Ordered that clerk with the county clerk of Marion county, and the City of Woodburn as to justice of claims filed in this court.

In the matter of apportionment of reward for capture of Frank Smith murderer, ordered that said matter be continued until July term in order that all claimants may be heard and settlement made as to who is entitled to receive reward.

In the matter of the Paul Schneider road, ordered that Mary L. Woodcock, Lew Woodcock and George Perdue be allowed as damages the amount of one Dollar each; that road be established as a county road, and that supervisor open said road with labor of petitioners and that expense account be paid.
