Grants Franchise for Telephone Line in Vicinity of Clackamas.

Judge Grant B. Dimica, and Commissioners T. B. Killen and John Lewellen, comprising the county court, met for the second time Wednesday and buckled up against consid-erable business of importance to Clackamas county. In the afternoon they wen to Oswego to inspect the new bridge there, which is nearing completion at the hands of the con-tractors, C. F. Royal and Son, of Salem. The bridge will be thrown open for travel in a very short time. Ginder & Co. were granted a fran-chise by the court to construct and operate telephone lines from near Danchy's place on the Oregon City and Damascus road; also from Clackamas bridge on the Oregon City and Milwaukie road to Milwaukie. It is understood that the grantees are representing the Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph Company and that the road will be mutualized after its construction, and will be connected up with the Pacific States Company to the outside world.


