OREGON CITY BOY HONORED.

Kenneth Latourette Makes Phi Beta Kappa.

Kenneth Latourette, who recently graduated from Yale with high honors, is expected home soon and will spend the summer here with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Latourette. Kenneth Latourette has probably won more honors as a student at Yale than has been the lot of any other local young man who has gone away to college, or any young man residing in the state for that matter. He was one of the high men in the class of 1906 and won the Foote Fellowship, which is valued at \$450. This was granted Mr. Latourette for exceptional work in history and economics. Among other honors he also made the Phi Beta Kappa society. His post graduate work at Yale will occupy him for one year and then it is his intention to devote his work in the missionary field and to that end is one of the student volunteers for that kind of work. To fit himself for this he will later attend a seminary devoted to equipping young men for this vocation. Mr. Latourette has long been recognized as one of the brightest young men of the community. He kept up that reputation as a student in the

High school and later on at McMinville College. His recent honors are a source of gratification, not only to his family, but to a large number of friends.

D. Eby of this city was secured to defend the prisoner, who was locked up in the strong house in Molalla. But in the night Miller fled. He escaped from the jail and went down the road mounted upon the back of constable Frank Adam's favorite horse. The country was quickly aroused by the farmer's telephone system and the offender was quickly caught at Beaver Creek. When brought before the justice again he pleaded guilty and was brought to Oregon City to face a double charge, horse breaking and probably horse stealing, though it is not known whether or not the constable will bring action.

To Kill Canadian Thistle.

County Judge G. B. Dimick has just returned from a tour of inspection in the neighborhood of Haley, on the O. W. P., where the Canadian thistle is reported to be thriving. The Judge said Monday that there was about an acre of the thistles and they are of the worst variety. He brought a sample to town with him which was about four feet high. From this acre the entire county might be overrun, but orders have been issued whereby supervisor Hall of that district will make war on the weed and crush out its life.

Whereas, on the 25th day of June, 1906, the Secretary of State in my presence as Governor of the State of Oregon did canvass the votes given for and against said proposed amendment to the constitution, and

Whereas, it was ascertained and determined upon such canvass that there were 47,661 votes cast therefor, and 18,751 votes against the same, and that said proposed amendment received an affirmative majority of the total number of effective votes cast thereon and entitled to be counted under the provisions of law, and

Now, Therefore, I, George E. Chamberlain, as Governor of the State of Oregon, in obedience to and by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by law, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the State of Oregon, and do announce and declare that the whole number of votes cast in the State of Oregon, at said election for and against said proposed amendment was as hereinbefore stated, and that said proposed amendment received an affirmative majority of the total number of votes cast thereon and entitled to be counted under the provision of law, and that said amendment hereinbefore mentioned shall be and is in full force and effect as a part of the Constitution of the State of Oregon from the date of this proclamation.
