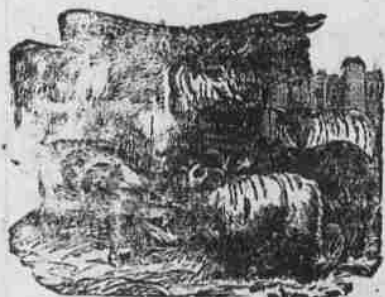

MOLALLA PEOPLE SKEPTIC.

Place Little Faith In Various Flying Railroad Rumors.

It is evident, from conversation with residents of the Molalla section, that very little faith is placed by them in the several railroad rumors that have abounded during the past few months. They have heard the story, in various forms, for years, and place little or no credence in the reports that reach their ears.

It is more than probable, however, that railroad construction will actually commence in the course of a year or two, and perhaps less, and that Molalla will be bound to Oregon City with bands of steel. The section is extremely rich, but not thickly populated, and there is room for hundreds of thousands of people. Some of the finest fruit lands in the state are situated between Milk Creek and the Molalla River, and the expense of clearing this territory would be comparatively small.

County Judge Grant B. Dinick is fathering a project to build a line and if sufficient stock is taken, will form a corporation. Portland capital is also interested in a project the details of which have not been made public, but it is understood an effort will soon be made to obtain a right of way. There seems to be no question but that an electric line would be a paying investment from the start.

OREGON CONFERENCE ENDS.

Evangelical Chautauqua Closes at Jennings Lodge.

It is expected that by next Summer an auditorium will be erected on the convention grounds that are owned by the Oregon conference. Many of the building lots have been sold and it is probable that several cottages will be erected there.

More Than Doubles Value of Estate By Careful Management.

The management of the estate shows what can be done under careful administration. When the estate was admitted to probate in 1887, its value was \$4319, according to the appraisal. Mr. Lee took the matter in his hands with such success that there will be distributed among the heirs no less than \$10,500, and this amount is in excess of all of the expenses of administering the estate.
