Disposes of 338 Acres Near Gladstone for \$21,900.

The property is on the east side of the tracks of the Oregon Water Power & Railway Company and joins Gladstone. It is not the home place of Mr. Steel, who was last June elected State Treasurer, and who goes to Salem to reside with his family in January next.

STAIRS TO COME DOWN

Five Ordinances Passed—Arranging For Fire Alarm System.

The old Eighth street stairs, which have been an eyesore to the residents of this city for a long time, and which have served their purpose faithfully, will be torn down. This order was made Friday at a meeting of the council. The construction of the new steel stairs with approaches from Seventh and Eighth streets, rendered the old stairway of little value, and the woodwork has become rotted, the steps being closed to travel several weeks ago. The council passed five ordinances, as follows:

Authorizing the purchase of a street fire the electric current could be shut off instantly. The latter company agreed to install a switchboard and other necessary apparatus, and to operate a line free of cost, and suggested the line be constructed by the Portland General Electric Company. The electric company, however, conveyed the information to the city that the apparatus should be constructed without cost to the company. The matter was postponed until a later meeting.

Regulating the speed of automobiles and other motor vehicles to eight miles per hour, in conformity with the state law.

Providing for the naming of streets. Providing for numbering of houses.

There was presented to the council a remonstrance against locating the Sixth street stairway on Fifth street, and the matter was referred, with instruction to confer with the Southern Pacific Company. An effort will be made to secure the construction of combination steps by the railroad company, with approaches from Fifth and Sixth streets, similar to the stairways from Seventh and Eighth streets.

Letters were received from the Portland General Electric Company and the Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph Company relative to the establishment of an alarm system, so that in case of
