men had proved up on years ago, to the edge of Clackamas Canyon. Here we unhitched our team and prepared to follow the trail down into the Clackamas Canyon, from where one can see many beautiful sights. I will only mention the most prominent ones.

We had got almost half way down when we looked across and saw the gigantic bluffs of the Clackamas River, which looked as it were over a thousand feet high, standing up almost perpendicular. After he had watched it a while, we saw it was divided off into benches of about five, and each bench set back about 20 feet, and was about 200 feet high, composed of different colored rocks. Occasionally a fir tree was seen standing on one bench, and reaching nearly to the top of the other. At the left of this bluff is a series of rocks that puts one in mind of the Giant's Causeway, which ends in the form of a chimney, which stands about 600 feet high; the chimney about 100 feet. We, however, continued our journey, and came to what is known as Jacob's Ladder, and had to descend it by the aid of a rope. After all had got down we went to the mouth of the south fork of the Clackamas, and ascended it to the falls. There we saw the water pouring over a precipice over 80 feet high, hemmed in on both sides by overhanging bluffs, with just room enough to get to the falls on both sides. We could feel the spray of the falls falling before we got near them, and had to get under the edge of the bluff to keep from getting wet. Each one looked at the falls for a while and returned home feeling well paid for their trip. Clackamas County has many sights and will rank with any of them.

There is a big prune crop, though being so plentiful, they are rather small.

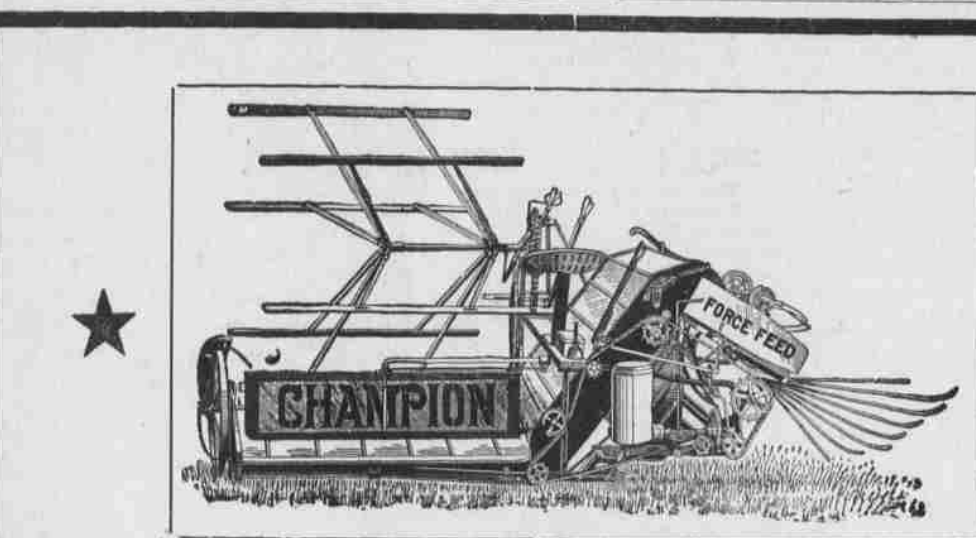
