CONDUCTOR ANNOYED Rogues on Street Cars Insult Conductor. INVITED OFF TO FIGHT Sunday Night Hoodlums Have Many Words of Insult But Won't Fight Conductor. Street car conductors have a hard time of it and the worst part of it in the discharge of their duties they receive little thanks from the traveling public. They have to stand all kinds of complaints and harsh language and don't have an opportunity to defend themselves in kind for that would give the passenger an excuse of suing the company for some alleged assault. And when the conductor tries to collect a fare from a man who is habitually half drunk and pugnacious it is indeed hard. For some time past there has been trouble on the late cars which is caused by hoodlums living around Oak Grove and Center. On Sunday evenings these fellows come to Oregon City in gangs and in such numbers that they believe that they can run the cars to suit themselves. The more bold spirits carry on the attempt on week-day nights when they have not the strength of numbers behind them. On Sunday night there was a large crowd on a car in charge of Conductor Cason. The conductor in collecting fares from the crowd was greeted with insults and jeers, which were of such a nature to make an ordinary citizen commence shooting. The car was early into Milwaukie, however, and with the help of other employees of the company the toughs were subdued. The insults were so galling to Cason that at one point on the trip where the car stopped he got off the car and invited any one of the crowd to get off and fight. The invitation was not accepted. Some unknown man at Oak Grove troubled Mr. Cason again Tuesday night and swore at him and insulted him again. He is thought to have been one of the offenders of Sunday night. Cason could not leave his car to take after the man when he got off at Oak Grove but another passenger, who was incensed at the insults thrown at the conductor, chased the offender some distance but was unable to catch him.
