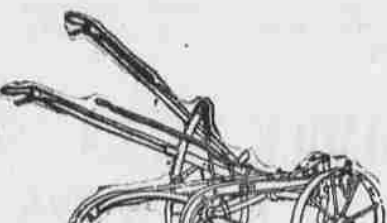

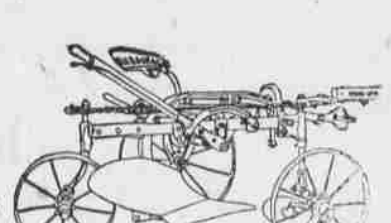

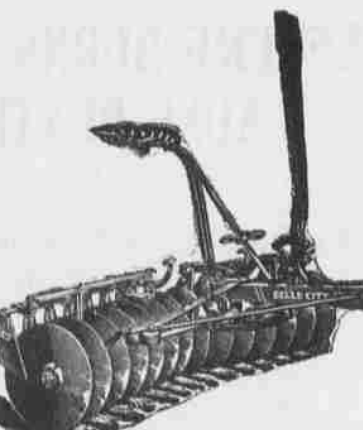
WALKING PLOWS. Wood and Steel Beam.
