#### ELECTION OF U. S. SENATORS

A Matter in Which the Grange is Actively Interested.

There is a growing interest in the matter of electing United States senators by popular vote. A somewhat novel feature of the recent Oregon state election was the expression by the voters of the state of their choice for senator. The law of the state does not permit election of senators by the people, and this was simply a test vote. What is most interesting is the fact that the candidate that would have been elected by the people is not the one which would have been designated by the legislature. Senator Gearin is the present incumbent and was a candidate in the recent test election, but the majority of the popular vote was in favor of his adversary. The majority in the present legislature is of the same political faith as Senator Gearin; consequently his election would have been assured, but in view of the fact that the expression of popular opinion was against him he has advised the legislature to select his adversary instead.

That the election of senators by the people will soon be the law in many states, if not all, is quite evident. Such action must be secured by an amendment to the constitution. Already representatives of nineteen states have requested congress to call a convention for the purpose of submitting a constitutional amendment.

It is well known by all members of the Order of Patrons of Husbandry that the popular election of senators has been one of their aims for several years. Each year the national master has asked the state organization to work to this end, and the creation of a public sentiment in favor of popular election of senators is due very largely to the quiet work of the grange throughout various states.

#### THE GRANGE RECOGNIZED.

It Was the Leader in Promoting Legislation For Denatured Alcohol.

The grange has the credit for the successful agitation by the state granges and many subordinate granges of the question of the removal of the internal revenue tax on alcohol for industrial purposes. National Master Bacheelder says with regard to it "that while influence was exerted through other agencies, not for a moment has it been denied in any quarter that the grange has been the leader in promoting this legislation, and credit is due each of the 800,000 members in the United States who has interested himself or herself in this very important matter. Especial credit is due the masters of the various state granges for particularly energetic work. The result in this matter demonstrates the great influence of the grange when its members are united upon a worthy object of legislation and go vigorously and energetically about securing it.

That the grange is entitled to credit for leadership in securing this legislation is indicated by the following resolution adopted by the National Association of Piano Manufacturers in session in Washington, being one of a series of resolutions unanimously adopted favoring the passage of the free alcohol bill:

Resolved, That we extend the sincere thanks of this association to the national grange, Patrons of Husbandry, to whose intelligent and far reaching campaign of education the present favorable status of this subject in congress is very largely due.

#### J. T. Allman.

J. T. Allman is the efficient secretary of the Pennsylvania state grange. His boyhood was spent on the farm, and in 1874 he entered the sophomore class at Princeton university and graduated in 1877. He taught in Texas for the following year, then returned home to take charge of the academy at Port Royal, Pa., where he remained for two years; then he spent three years in New Mexico and returned to the Pennsylvania homestead in 1888.

He purchased a farm, on which he has since resided, in 1888, having joined the grange in 1884. In 1900 he was chosen state lecturer, which position he filled for four years, and in 1904 he was elected secretary of the state grange and has been re-elected every two years since that time. He is an industrious, painstaking worker, with a single purpose to do well whatever work there is for him to do.

#### A Picnic Suggestion.

The grange picnic or field meeting can be a most useful adjunct to grange work if rightly conducted. The aims and purposes of the grange should always be presented briefly with a view to informing the many farmers who do not know as to what the grange is endeavoring to do for their interests.

#### Co-operative Burying.

Pioneer grange of Cranbury, N. J., is doing well in the line of co-operative burying. It has purchased \$2,000 worth of clover seed in connection with the grange at Hightstown, also \$5,000 worth of fertilizers and three carloads of seed potatoes.

#### New Deputy Game Warden.

DAMASCUS, Or., Dec. 20.—Max Schneider has been appointed deputy state game warden by State Game and Forestry Warden Baker. Mr. Schneider is the kind of an officer who will attend to his duties with all determination and perseverance, and possible and the indiscriminate and lawless slaughter of birds will have to stop in this section of the country. Mr. Schneider himself is passionately fond of hunting and realizes that something has to be done towards the abatement of the present rather sorry state of affairs and discipline of Nimrod will probably realize that Mr. Schneider will enforce the laws.

### XMAS COMES TO US AGAIN

Churches and Schools Will Hold Exercises.

#### PROGRAMS BY CHILDREN
