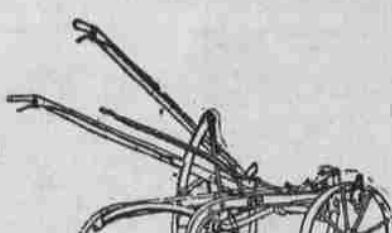

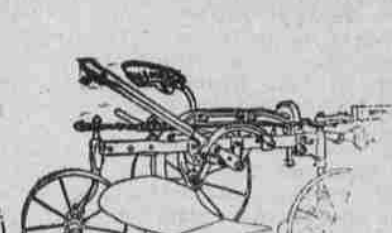

Wood and Steel Beam.



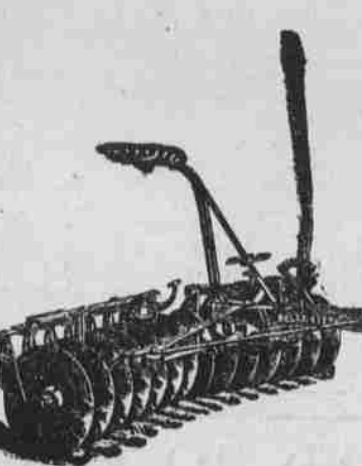
