

LEGISLATURE TAKES A REST.

Senator Hedges Has Good Prospects For Places on Committees.

State Senator Joseph Eugene Hedges, Joint Representative James U. Campbell, and Representatives Clyde G. Huntley, Linn E. Jones and Charles H. Dye returned Wednesday afternoon on the special legislative train from Salem, as the legislature has adjourned until next Monday morning. Mr. Hedges is in the Democratic band wagon and is one of the four who helped to make the election of Mr. Haines as president of the senate possible, and it is very likely that he will fall in for something in the way of committees.

Representatives Huntley, Campbell and Dye were supporters of Mr. Dyer, the successful aspirant for the speakership and they will very probably be rewarded when the committee appointments are announced next Monday morning. Mr. Jones is credited with having stayed by Vawter to the last.
