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THE OREGON LEGISLATURE.

The law-makers at Salem need only a few days to exhibit their attainments when the public mind will classify our 90 public servants in whom has been reposed the trust and confidence of the people of Oregon. On one side will be placed the class of politicians commonly known as ward-healers who have gained the suffrage of their districts by sharp practice and trickery and under false pretenses. On the other side will be enumerated the men who possess some of the attributes of statesmanship and who realize their responsibility in a representative Government. To this first mentioned class nothing will appear proper legislation or worthy their consideration unless it bears the official stamp of partisan politics. No argument in favor of a law will appeal to them unless it can be shown that its enactment will further some partisan political end. This class has had too large a representation in former legislatures—let us hope that in this present session its ranks are thinned and powerless.

Numerous commissions will be proposed and if the present legislature creates them there is but one intelligent manner by which their personnel can be made up; that is by the Chief Executive's appointment. If a commission betrays its trust there is then a source of responsibility to which the injured public may appeal. This source, the Chief Executive must have power of removal of a member of a commission who shall prove unfaithful to his trust.

It is a matter worthy of no consideration whatever that the present Governor happens to be a Democrat. A principle is involved and it applies no matter what may be the party politics of the Chief Executive. That principle is the placing definitely the responsibility of administering State affairs and that responsibility can not rest on the Head of the State government if the power of appointment of subordinate officers is denied.

If there are members of the Legislature incapable of arising to an intelligent conception of the principles of government; if there are those who persist in the worn out practice of toying with the people's interests in order to promote the game of the political boss and manipulator, these should be marked now in order that they may be prevented, at subsequent times, from slipping into places of public responsibility.

The present governor has advocated the creation of several commissions; notably a railroad commission. Should this legislature create such a commission and provide for the selection of its members in a manner suitable to the railroads, there is no doubt but it will prove a failure in the end. If there is no responsibility back of the commission this will satisfy the railroads. Such a commission has no horror for large financial concerns. But such trickery as this will prove a boomerang. The time has come years passed since the people could be fooled by the worn out methods of the political crook. The demand is for a railroad commission that will get results—that has a responsible head. Will the legislature accede to this demand or will it attempt to evade it by a pretended compliance. Every legislator who fails to meet the question fairly and intelligently will be called on by an enlightened constituency to answer for his course. The only way to make explanation easy is to pursue a course that conforms to the spirit and desire of the people.

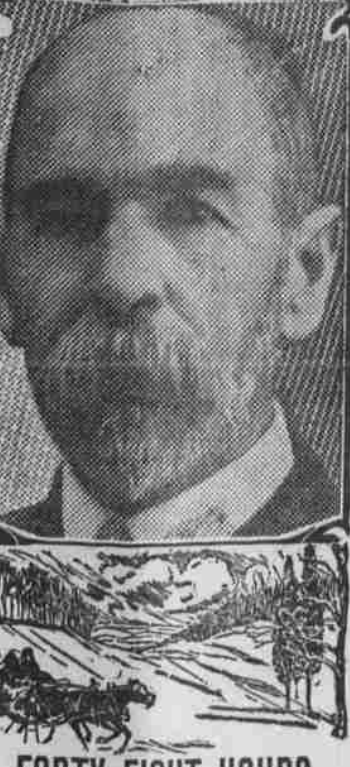

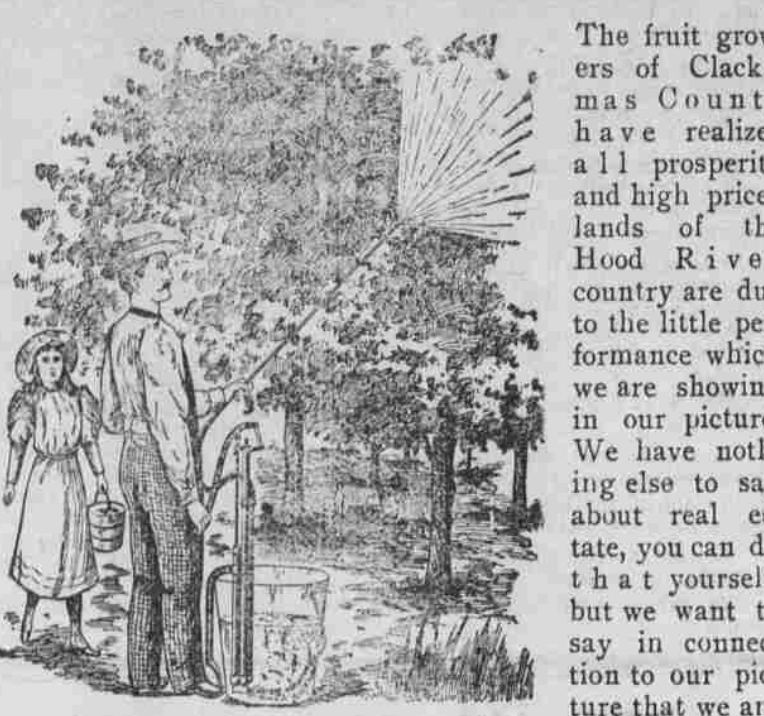
