

### HORNETS NEST STIRRED UP

#### Elingson As Supervisor Not Acceptable.

### STAFFORDITES OBJECT

#### Claim Majority Want Henry Baker For Position—Officials Say they Work for Best Interest.

Somewhat of a hornet's nest has been stirred up at Stafford, through the appointment by the court of Zach Elingson as road supervisor of that district. Prior to the appointment a number of residents antagonistic to Elingson, circulated a petition which was signed, it is alleged, by a majority of the citizens and property owners of the district asking that the court appoint Henry Baker to the position. Their wishes were not complied with, however, by the court, hence there is much indignation.

The opposition to Elingson claims that his appointment was made to further the political ends of certain persons and not for the best welfare of the district in which he will work. Among the disgruntled ones a resolution has been drawn up and signed which it is expected will shortly be published denouncing the actions of the county officials in the matter and explaining why they think that the present appointment was made and also why in their belief that it should not have been.

The officials who made the appointment state that Elingson has been the road supervisor in the district for two years past and that his work speaks for itself as to his ability to successfully fill the position. He was appointed, they claim, solely on his merits for the past work he has done. In reference to the petition circulated favoring Baker for the office they claim that in many instances it was signed by people who were led to believe by the petitioners that Elingson would not be an applicant again for the position. As the matter stands at the present time there is much bitter feeling existing on both sides of the question.

### PLENTY OF MONEY FOR TAXES.

#### Sheriff Beattie Receiving Requests to Take Money.

One evidence of the prosperity of Clackamas county may be found in the eagerness with which people are calling at the Sheriff's office to pay their taxes. The 1906 rolls have not yet been turned over to the sheriff for collection nor will they be until Monday, February 4, but already over 200 persons have called with money in their pockets to pay to the county, and requests to be allowed to pay are coming in by mail.

On February 11th will occur the Sheriff's sale of property on which the taxes for 1905 are delinquent. Sheriff Beattie says that out of the \$2500 on the rolls, about \$250 has been paid in up to the present time.
