Bad colds and the grip are prevalent throughout this neighborhood; though no very serious cases are reported.

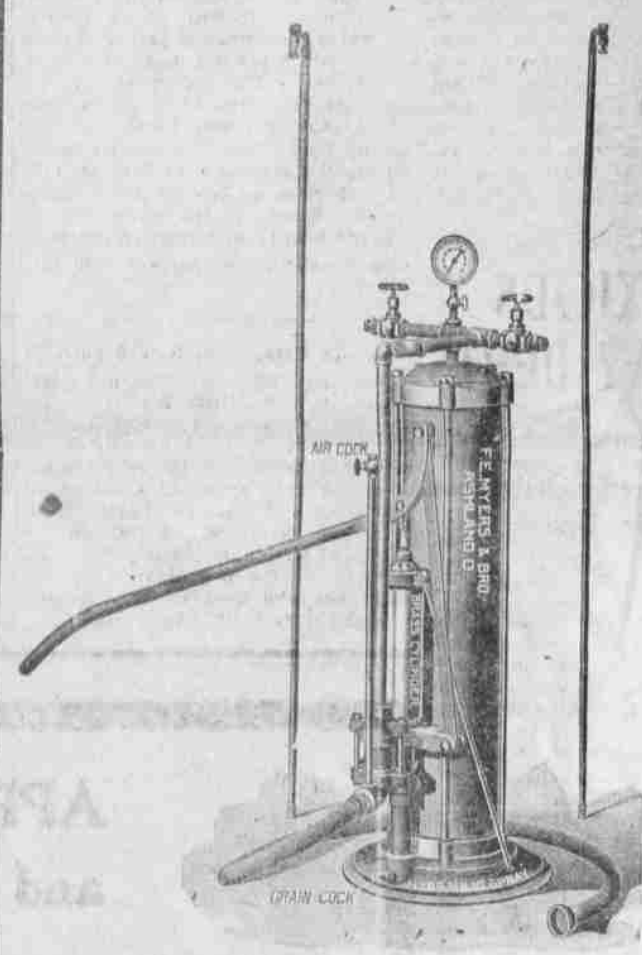
Owing to the sudden rise in the price of potatoes, buyers are rushing around, and some of the farmers have sold. Others are holding for higher prices.

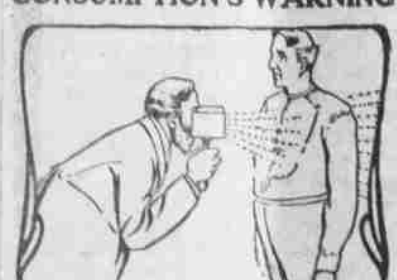
Fred Kelhe is building a new barn. Frank Grossmuller of Portland is visiting relatives and friends for a few days.
