TRY ONCE MORE FOR HIGH SCHOOL

Bill Introduced to Provide For Union High School.

If the efforts of those connected with the educational work in Clackamas county can accomplish the results they are after, the school system will soon be greatly improved. Representative Dye has introduced a bill in the Oregon legislature providing for the union of two or more school districts for the purpose of erecting and maintaining a high school. It has long been a matter of concern that a city the size of Oregon City should be without a high school that would admit its graduates to the State University on diploma. At different times attempts have been made to bring about a better condition of school affairs, and the alumni association has been active in advocating measures to provide a high school worthy of the town, but so far nothing has come of its efforts.

As the young people of the town reach the eleventh grade they must go out of town to complete their high school course. At present 41 students from Oregon City enrolled in the high school of Corvallis, a diploma from which admits to the University. Others attend the high school in Park place which was erected not long ago, and still others make the trip to Portland for the purpose of obtaining high school education. It is estimated that a high school in Oregon City would have an attendance of at least 150, as the number graduated from the eighth grade last year was 155, and more, receive their certificates each year.

Superintendent of Schools Zinser has had this matter at heart as well as the alumni association, and has drafted a bill which he is going to introduce into the legislature through one of the local members of this session, the bill introduced by Mr. Dye forestalls Zinser's bill, and covers all the points that are included in the one drawn by the superintendent. It is to be hoped that the opposition that has seemed to attend all previous efforts to get a bill of this nature passed will be withdrawn, and that all factions will work in harmony for the good of the county.

WATER RIGHTS SOLD.

Mt. Hood Railway and Power Co. Acquire Riparian Rights.

Fifteen deeds were filed at the court house Tuesday transferring the water rights of the Syndicate Investment Co. to the Mt. Hood Railway and Power Co. The deeds were for the water rights of the Sandy, the Little Sandy, the Clackamas, the Salmon and the Bull Run rivers. A trust deed was also filed by the Mt. Hood Railway and Power Co. on the property thus transferred mortgaging it to the Union Trust Co. of San Francisco for \$5,000. The agent of the Trust Company who filed the mortgage is understood to be one of the high officials. He took all precautions possible to keep the matter secret. The Mt. Hood proposed railway goes through about twenty-five miles of this county.

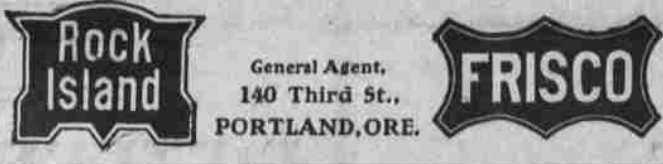
