

NEWS OF THE COUNTY

LOGAN.

The farmers' institute on February 13th came at an inopportune time and the attendance was not what it should have been. On account of the bad weather of Fall and Winter, farmers are behind with plowing and the good weather could not be lost for plowing and sowing. Also the masquerade ball was on for the following night, and the young folks had no room in their minds for lighter matters. However there was a fair attendance in the evening and the speakers had an attentive audience. Dr. James Withycombe introduced the other speakers and gave an explanation of the pictures of the agricultural college buildings and appliances, and of live stock and of other matter. The doctor spoke earnestly of the necessity of some kind of stock farming and dairying to keep up the fertility of the soil instead of selling grain and hay. He said that Washington county is in the lead in dairying and general progress and prosperity; that the flouring mills there are the homes of bats and owls.

Mr. Schulmerich gave an interesting address on dairying. He is opposed to dual purpose cows and said the little, bony, skinnier Jerseys are in the lead. He recommended kale very highly as winter feed. He received last year, from a herd of thirty cows, an income of \$3300.

Mr. Judd was very enthusiastic about the profit of raising to sell and the pleasure of handling and driving heavy draft horses. He is a successful breeder.

Mr. Lewis, the fruit inspector, made an earnest plea for proper care of orchards, not for fear of the law, but for the profit it will bring.

P. E. Edwards, chemist of the agricultural college, gave by means of charts, a scientific explanation of the reason why selling grain and hay depletes the soil.

The masquerade ball on the 14th was a social success, and moderately so financially. About forty numbers were sold and everybody had a "close" time. If the word painter that wrote up the Damascus masquerade had been present, he could have furnished a three column article containing all the superlative adjectives of the English language with selections from all the foreign tongues.

The costumes were varied all the way from comic to grand and the characters were well sustained. Four prizes were given. Mr. Miller and Lulu Holcomb received first prizes, and Karl Fallert and Mrs. Linn were awarded second prizes.

The evening session of Harding Grange on Feb. 16th, had a larger attendance for a special day meeting of Feb. 25th, when State Master Buxton will be present in connection with the degree and literary contest work now in progress. It is expected that there will be a large attendance. An interesting program was rendered consisting mostly of discussions on topics from the state bulletin.

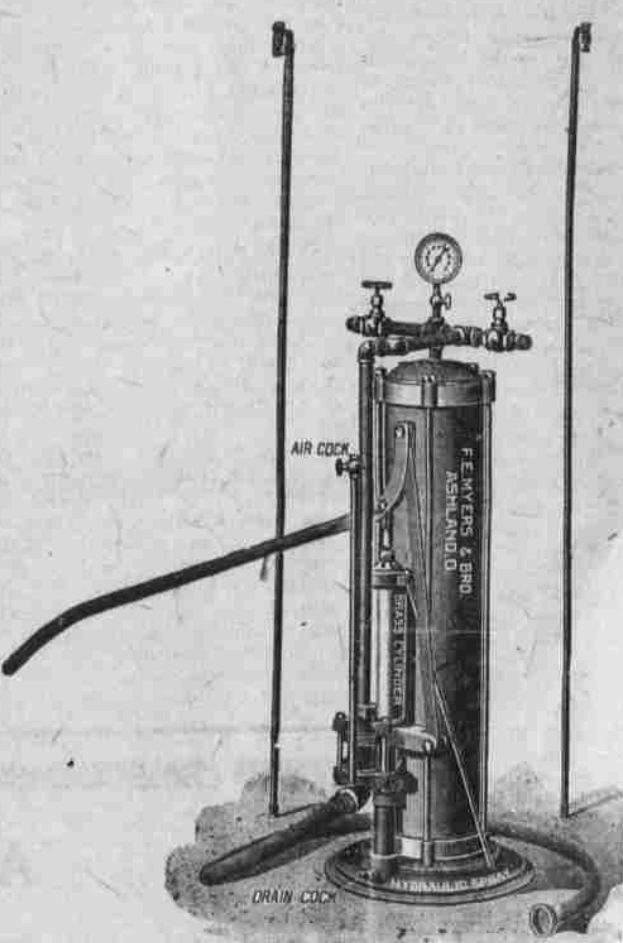
