Mrs. Ella Dunbar went to Middleton Monday to visit relatives.

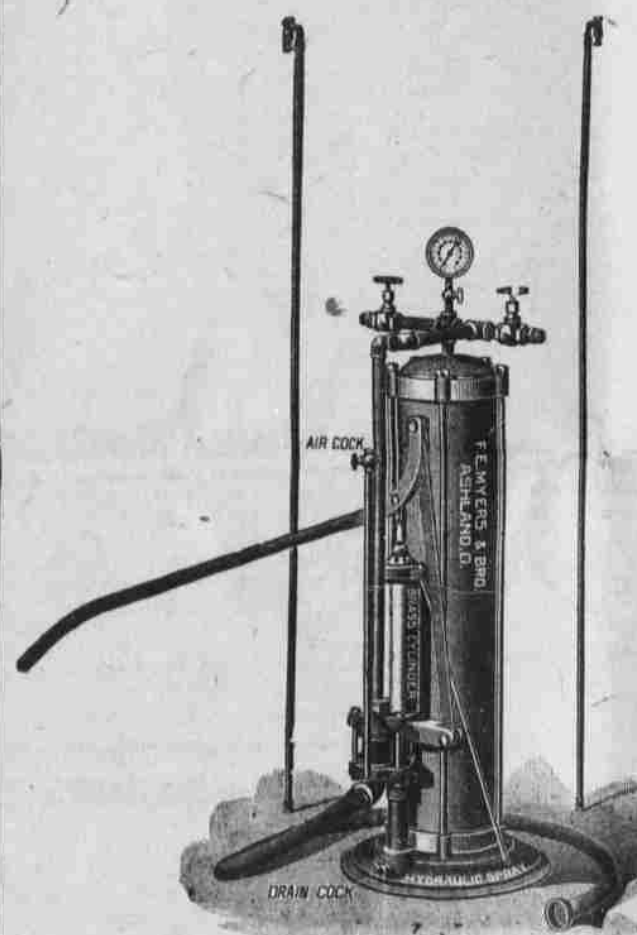
