ENTHUSIASM AT OAK GROVE

Everybody Pulls Together
To Advance Interests
of The Town.

Oak Grove Improvement association held an enthusiastic meeting last Thursday night in the school house at Oak Grove, and talked over things of interest to the thriving little town. Judge Dimick had been asked to make an address, and he collected some of the members of the county court and all went down in a body.

The school house was crowded with residents of Oak Grove who were interested in the development of their town. The program included selections by a Ladies' Quartet, vocal solos by Mr. Lewis, a vocal duet by Miss Jahn and Mr. Klehl, and addresses by Judge Dimick, Former Judge Ryan, Mayor Canfield, John Lewellen. Judge Dimick spoke particularly on the subject of the county roads, as the matter of street improvements was brought up before the meeting.

The improvement association is a typical village booster club, where everyone in the town tries to work for the best interest of the community, and where all are enthusiastic about their particular town as the best place on earth to live. It has done much for the good of Oak Grove, and the president, B. Lee Paget, announced last night that the association had a membership of 124. Oak Grove has a population of possibly 600. As a result of the efforts of the boosters the town is now being wired for electric lights, and improvements in the way of better streets, good sidewalks and telephone service are being sought.

At the meeting Thursday night it was decided to co-operate with Clackamas and Oregon City in trying to secure more equitable passenger rates between Portland and points on the O. W. P. line running through Oak Grove. A committee from there will confer with the committee from the Oregon City Board of Trade which is working with this end in view.

"NOTHING LEFT BUT SCENERY."

J. W. Thomas, of Molalla Says Oregon City Deserves No More.

If Oregon City has "nothing left but scenery" she must console herself by remembering that it is the price paid for lost opportunity. And now unless she gets busy, and improves what few chances she has left to link up in touch (not jug-handle connection) with a section of the county that has been her main stay, one of these fine days there will come a railway into the southern portion of Clackamas county from other quarters and there will appear a denser covering of moss on the "scenery" in and around Oregon City.

Nothingwithstanding all explanation to the contrary, many south Clackamas county citizens are of the opinion that Oregon City has held up the O. W. P. Co. in building an electric railway line to the best part of the county. The city to this half of old Clackamas by providing in the franchise now wanted that an electric line be extended into the south Clackamas at least twenty miles within two years. Then go at it in earnest, and build your Oregon City and Molalla timber road. The opportunity is yours. Next year may be too late for procrastinating Oregon City.

There is no significance in the reference to south Clackamas' future, with our Meadowbrook, Molalla, Mackburg, Marquam and Needy right in line with similarity of appearance and interests, we can form a union of "many men of many minds."

RECENT FIRES.

Flames Do Damage in the County—Insurance Paid.

J. J. Boylen of Oregon City, R. F. D. No. 5, lost a house January 9th, amounting to \$18,000. M. H. Riehoff, on the Logan road to Oregon City, also had a narrow escape from losing his new house by fire January 18th. The big beam under the fire place that bears the house caught fire and burnt for a long time, before it was discovered and finally extinguished. The damage was \$20,000. Both parties are insured in the Farmers' Mutual F. R. A. of Portland, and their claims were promptly paid.

February 14th the big new barn of John L. Landeck near Beaver Creek burnt to the ground with a loss of \$1200. The insurance was \$600 in the Farmers' Mutual F. R. A. of Portland. With the exception of Mrs. Landeck, all the family was working in the field. Mr. Landeck in trying to save a few things badly burned his hands and arms. On the 19th Mr. Landeck had his loss paid in full and thankfully and contentedly wrote the receipt. There was a heavy wind blowing at the time, and the theory is that a cinder from the flue of the house was carried into the open barn. None of the men are in the habit of smoking.

ADD COPPER TO WEALTH

County Has Copper Vein
—Value Investigated
by Expert.

Clackamas county boasts among its undeveloped resources what is said to be a fine vein of copper. Up in the region beyond Molalla, which is as yet a virgin wilderness, it is known that "gold" and other minerals exist, and even now gold in paying quantities is being taken from the mines, but not in sufficient quantities to make it worth while to mine it.

Joseph Green of Portland, however, has located 320 acres of what he considers fine copper land near Willhoit Springs. Monday night Mr. Green, with a party from Portland, among whom was a prominent mining expert from Montana, left here by wagon to drive to the claim, which is about eight miles beyond the Springs. They expect to be gone several days, and will look over the ground thoroughly bringing back with them an opinion from the expert as to whether the claim will pay or not.

Mr. Green stated that while he had done very little yet towards developing the claim, he has a small tunnel bored into the mountain, and is convinced from the samples of ore already taken out that he has a copper property of undoubted value. If the report of the expert is as favorable as he has every reason to suppose, steps will be taken at once to form a company to go ahead with the development of the claim. Mr. Green owns the property outright, holding a deed to the half-section on which he has found the copper.
