

MAJ. CHARMAN LAID TO REST

Funeral Held Sunday Under
Masonic Auspices—Many
Floral Offerings

The funeral of the late Major Thomas Charman was held on Sunday afternoon from the Masonic Temple at one o'clock. The remains lay in state in the Masonic Temple from nine to eleven, and many of his friends and fellowtownsmen took this opportunity of paying their respects to his memory. The funeral itself was one of the largest that has ever been held here.

Mr. Charman was a Past Master of the Masonic lodge, and the funeral services were in charge of that body. The Rev. P. K. Hammond read the burial service of the Episcopal church, of which the deceased was a member, and made a few appropriate remarks, and J. E. Hedges followed him with a eulogy, paying tribute to the memory of the old pioneer both as a man and as a citizen.

The interment was made in the family lot in Mountain View cemetery, and was conducted according to the Masonic ritual by Worshipful Master Clark Ganong. The honorary pall bearers were: W. E. Carl, George Clark, George Harding, Joseph Buchtel, George Horton, John Lewthwaite, Sr., D. B. Martin. Those who conveyed the body to its resting place were: W. A. Huntley, F. W. Greenman, J. E.

Hedges, C. W. Evans, Harry Jones and Capt. Robert Young.

The floral offerings were many and beautiful, and testified to the esteem in which Major Charman was held by all.

GOES TO WORK TO SQUARE UP

Jesse George, one of the proprietors of the George Bros. restaurant, cashed a check last week for a man who gave the name of W. M. Edwards and claimed to be a horse buyer from Colorado. Later the check was found to be worthless by telegraphic information from the bank in Colorado Springs on which it was drawn. When Edwards found that he was discovered, he became very penitent, and protested his willingness to work and pay off the money as soon as he could if he were not prosecuted.

He secured a job in the paper mills, and will be kept watch of till he has satisfied the claim against him. Edwards also tendered a check at Wright's Shoe store in payment for a pair of boots, but it was not accepted. He took the boots and promised to pay for them later. Wright will also keep an eye on him till the boots are paid for.

COUNTY CLERK WAS WORKED

Unsuspectingly Gives Out
Information—Not Only
Easy Man in Case.

County Clerk Greenman is mourning the loss of a fee which he allowed to get away from him. In simple language he was worked for the amount of the transcription of a certified copy of a marriage record.

In February D. C. Merryman wrote from Bengal in the Indian Territory asking how much it would cost him to have a copy of a marriage record made. For reasons of his own he wished to have a copy of the record by which it might be known that Jonathan Stoker had married his wife, Sadie in due and lawful form. Clerk Greenman replied, stating the amount which would be required to obtain this information, and then waited patiently for an answer containing the fee.

Yesterday he discovered he had been worked when a suit was filed by Jonathan Stoker asking for a divorce from his wife, Sadie, alleging cruelty, desertion, and finally, that she had married another man. The other man was the same Merryman who had asked for the information that he got so cheaply. The two husbands had evidently put their heads together and decided to save money by getting all they could for nothing, and the evidence that the county clerk supplied when he unwittingly fell into the trap set for him, enabled them to complete

the chain of incrimination against the woman, and Stoker was furnished with good grounds for divorce.

The complaint alleges that Stoker and his wife were married in Oregon City May 8, 1905, and mentions the cruelty with which the plaintiff was treated, going on to state that in July, 1906 she deserted him, going back to her former home in Medill, Missouri, and writing him from there that she was perfectly willing he should get a divorce.

That the clerk of Clackamas county is not the only easy man in the case is evidenced by the fact that according to the complaint Mrs. Stoker later passed herself off for a widow in the Indian Territory, and that Merryman fell a victim to her wiles to the extent of marrying her.

Stoker also considers himself easy in marrying her in the first place, and asks to be separated from such a woman.

GETS A BEATING FOR BUTTING IN

Floyd Jones "got his" last Sunday night for butting in. A game of cards was in progress in Knightly's saloon, and in the course of the game Frank Hill, one of the players got "stuck." On reaching for the money to pay for the game, he found that he had left his change in his other pocket. Jones, it is said, who was watching the game, called him "a beat," which was more than Hill could stand, and he proceeded to express his disapproval by knocking Jones down and beating and kicking him till he was a mass of blood. A doctor was called and took three stitches in Jones' head and one in his nose.
