Joe LaCroy intends to build a large barn this spring.

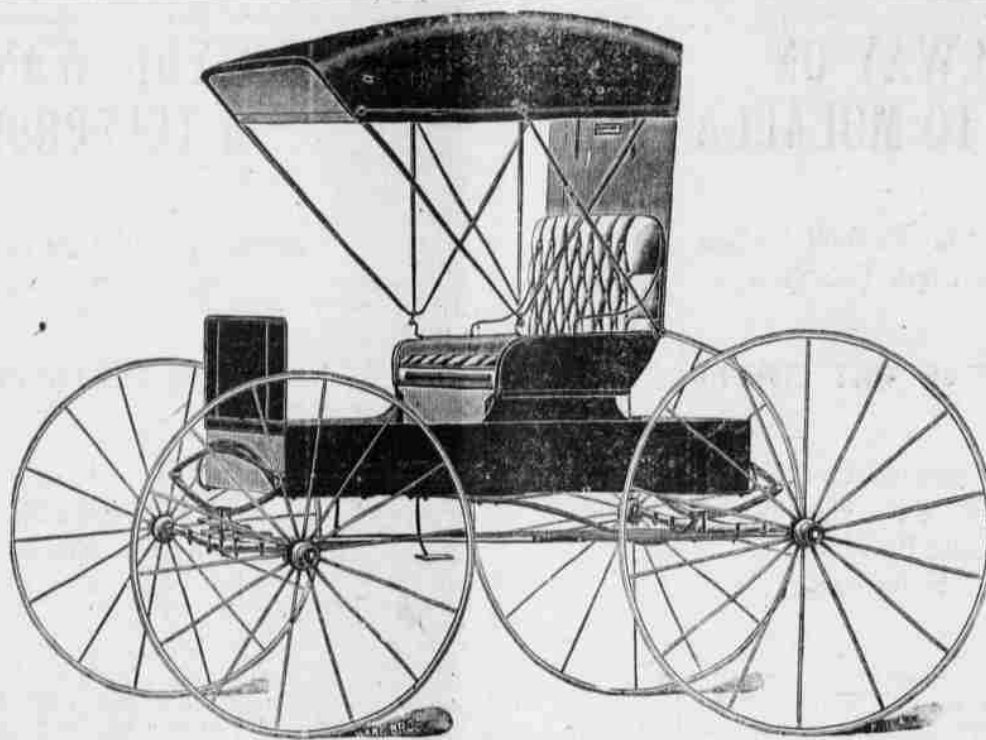
Loren Tenny and John Hamilton, Jr., are hauling oats to Oregon City.
