

CLEANUP IN OREGON CITY

Mayor Caulfield Will Soon Designate a Day

BUSCH GETS FRANCHISE

Workers in Street Department Want Higher Wages—New Sidewalk Ordinance

The city will have a clean up day, to be designated by Mayor Caulfield, and on that day the good people are expected to get busy and have the town in a spotless condition. The annual spring cleaning is coming on, and the desire of the council is to have the city clean up day. This was decided on at a regular meeting of the city council, which lasted until 12:30 o'clock, yesterday morning.

Dr. A. E. Sommer, who was Mayor Caulfield's predecessor in office was a spectator at the meeting and to him was extended the courtesies of the chamber.

John Gleason, St. Straight, et al., came forth to the council and petitioned for an increase in wages. Their work has consisted largely of street repairs, under the direction of Street Superintendent John C. Bradley, and they say that \$2 per day is not enough. The petition was referred to the street committee.

F. C. Burke served notice on the city to get off the earth, meaning to vacate a lot that he owns in the rear of Buckle's feed store that the city has been using for a roadway for 20 or 40 years. This was referred to the committee on streets.

Fire Chief Ruonich's report was referred to the committee on fire and water. The chief wants two new hydrants at Green Point and also desires to have the walk fronting the new Green Point engine house placed in repair for the safety of the fire ladders and the apparatus.

The ordinance regulating the construction of new sidewalks was passed. Property owners may construct 4-foot walks on unimproved streets, with permission from the city, but the walks on improved streets must be from six to ten feet in width. This applies to cross streets running into Main street, but after these cross streets are improved all new sidewalks must be of concrete. The proposed improvement of the cross streets running into Main will be taken up at special meeting to be held Wednesday evening, April 17, and several new ordinances will be presented at that time.

The telephone franchise granted to Frank R. Andrews and the rail way franchise granted to the Oregon Electric Company were repealed, as they have lapsed.

Frank Busch was given a franchise to pipe water from Slinger Hill Creek through a 12-inch main to his factory at Eleventh and Moss streets. He must have this main installed inside of two years, and is assessed \$10 per year for the use of the water.

The proposed improvement of upper Fifth street, known as the plank road, was referred to the committee on streets and public property.

Recorder Dimick was instructed to notify the Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph company that it had no franchise in Oregon City. The company is believed to be operating under a franchise granted to the Oregon Telephone company, but it seems to be the desire of the council to compel the company to obtain a new franchise.

Supply For Local Markets Has Been Coming From California.

Potatoes, onions, and rhubarb are the only fresh vegetables that are coming in from the country, the main supply coming from California. This situation, however, will not last, as green stuffs will begin to arrive in about two weeks and the consumers will be able to obtain fresh country produce. Eggs are plentiful. Local quotations on potatoes are firm. The receipts of fresh meats are strong. Wholesale buying prices paid by Oregon City merchants are:
