

NEWS OF THE COUNTY

Sandy.

Mr. Hood Electric Railway company has a large crew of men working, clearing and grading for the power house site. An hydraulic pipe is being laid carrying the water from the hillside nearby, to wash away dirt for the power house site. Considerable activity is going on all along the Sandy river.

Mr. McKorkle, promoter of the Mt. Hood Railway company, was on the Sandy looking about his company's interest here. He advises people to hold meetings and thereby encourage people to donate the right-of-way, as that mostly depends on the building of a railroad to Mt. Hood.

Three different railroad companies are now locating lines through this section to Mt. Hood, namely: Mt. Hood Electric Railway Co., which is building a power plant on the Sandy river, and is supposed to be backed by the Milwaukee-St. Paul line. The other companies are the Mt. Hood Railway company, whose interest is represented by M. G. McKorkle, and the O. W. P. Railway company, which has surveyed a line from Andersen Station to Mt. Hood. It is hoped by Sandy people that, at least one, of these proposed lines will be built.

O. Rambo has finally sold his farm to Mr. Yerzser, of Portland, who again sold half of that place to another party.

Among the real estate transfers that have taken place at this place are the following: Ira Dodge has sold his farm to Mrs. Jones, of Portland, for \$4200; F. Brunner has sold his 80 acres to Jonathan Bros. for \$3200; Chapman & Son have sold their small sawmill for \$1350 to Wilson & Co., who will continue the sawing of all kinds of lumber. Donahue & Co. sold their mill including land and timber to M. Olsen, consideration, \$9000, considered a good figure. Mull & Davis have sold their mill to the Oregon Tie Co. for \$4200.

Carl Mill company, a new mill, start in business of sawing ties in the timber of M. Dickerson. They are now putting in machinery.

The company holding options on timber here fell through since timber holders raised their prices. Amil Beck was offered for about 90 acres of timber (land not included) \$5000, cash, and received the offer.

H. P. Bruns was awarded the contract to build a five-room cottage 20x32, with an addition 14x16 for the Straus Lumber company.
