HIGH TIME ON FOURTH

Races and Sports Features of Celebration.

FIREMEN VERY ACTIVE

First Count Made In Contest For Goddess of Liberty and Miss Beryl Long Is In Lead.

The chairman of the Fourth of July celebration committee held a meeting Thursday night in the council chamber and partially completed definite plans for the celebration. There will be two bands engaged. John Adams, chairman of the music committee, is in communication with the St. Johns Band, which may be engaged. With a view of having plenty of music on the morning, afternoon and evening of the Fourth, probably \$335 will be disbursed for band music.

The horse races have been provided for by the \$250 appropriation of the city. J. A. McGlashan has charge of this feature and is working it out to a successful termination. There will be two races, with five teams competing in each. The wet test and the dry test races will be run on the afternoon of the Fourth.

Howard Latourette, chairman of the land sports committee, has arranged for a 100-yard dash, 220-yard run, 120-yard hurdle, fat man's race, 100-yard dash for boys under 14 years, and 50-yard dash for girls under 14 years. First and second prizes will be given for all of these events.

Sam Stow has the water sports in charge, and has on his list a high dive from the suspension bridge, log-rolling contest, canoe races, tub race, boat race, and two swimming races. It is probable that Separate Company G, Oregon National Guard, the Uniform Rank of the Woodmen of the world, and the Indian Costume Team of Wacheno Tribe Improved Order of Red Men, will participate in the parade which will be made a great feature of the celebration. Mrs. Fouts has the Liberty Car in charge, and the Goddess of Liberty will be enthroned on this car, surrounded by 44 little girls, representing the states of the Union. Many business men will have floats in the parade which will undoubtedly be the largest and best ever seen in this city.

Columbia Hook & Ladder Company is setting the pace for the horse races on the Fourth of July, and the company has elected Joseph Beaulieu captain of the team. The first practice was held Tuesday evening. The Hook & Ladder boys propose to see that the Fourth of July celebration shall be a success so far as their united effort can make it. The fire companies are expected to be a feature of the parade, with their red shirts and helmets. Fountain Hose Company, Cataract Hose Company, Hill Hose Company No. 3, and Ely Hose Company No. 4, will also participate in the parade and races. J. A. McGlashan has charge of the races for the committee, and promises to make a fine showing.

Miss Kate Mathies is the third young lady to enter the Goddess of Liberty contest, and will help to make the race a merry one. The other contestants so far as announced are Miss Beryl Long and Miss Gussie Humphrey. The contest is now in full swing and the votes will be counted and published twice each week until the close of the affair. The ballot boxes have been placed in the stores of John Adams, Huntley Bros. Co., Howell & Jones and George A. Harding, but tickets may be purchased at other stores.

Sam Stow, chairman of the committee on water sports leaves in about a week for California, to see his father who is ill, and his work will be taken up by his committee associates, Carl Moore and William E. Lewthwaite.

Miss Beryl Long leads in the contest for Goddess of Liberty. The vote was counted for the first time Tuesday night, and resulted as follows:

Logs For Pulp Mill.

Both sides of the river from the canal entrance to Greenpoint are lined with rafts for the Willamette Pulp & Paper Company. The logs are hemlock and spruce and come from the lower Columbia. As spruce is worth \$12 a thousand and hemlock \$6, it is figured that \$150,000 worth of logs will pass up the canal this summer.

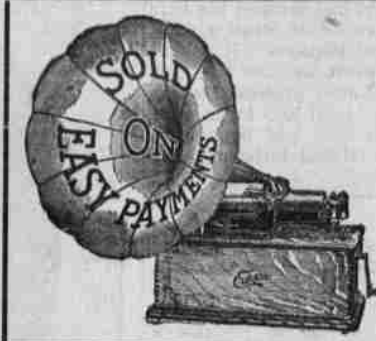
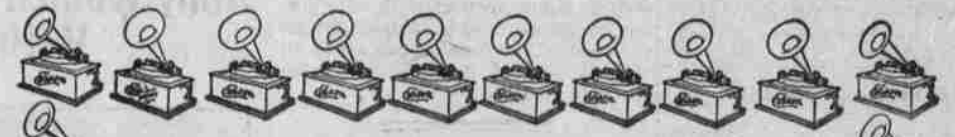
