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THE SUPREME LAW.

No wrong was done by the fusillade of bullets that sent Professor George Herbert where he belonged. The victim, having violated the most sacred of laws, having defied the law of God and man, thereby forfeited all claim to the law's protection. Society is rid of one of the vile lepers that infests it and instead of calling for the punishment of C. H. Reynolds, hails him as a benefactor. The pity is that there are not more men of the Reynolds type to exterminate these worthless, poisonous parasites that constantly threaten the home.

Yet influential Portland publications ask that the written law be applied to the man who availed himself of the "unwritten law." In other words, that his life be forfeited for surprising and shooting to death a sneaking, terrified beast that had invaded his home.

Legislatures may enact laws without end, they may establish the penalty for every vice, sin or crime, and they may write at the head of it all, "This is the Law." But, nevertheless, the head of a despoiled home will know but one fit penalty for the wrong that has been done him and unless he himself be a coward, he will inflict that penalty, hesitating no more than he would hesitate to slay a poisonous snake. More than that, he may go through the form of a trial, but as long as man has the right to a trial by a jury of twelve men, such a trial will be in form only with a verdict of "not guilty" written and subscribed in advance.

The "unwritten law" prevails and will prevail after all. There is no law but the law of public opinion and all so-called law that is not entrenched behind commonly accepted principles of justice, is nothing more than idle words. Are we to bewail the fact that he has not been permitted to avail himself of the technicalities of so-called law? The metropolitan press seems to have done so. Bear in mind; there is no law that applies to the savage beast of the forest; there is also no law that applies to the vile wretch who is entitled to less respect and less consideration than the beasts of prey that roam the mountain wilds.

TROUBLESOME JAPAN.

Eastern papers are full of strained relations existing between the United States and Japan. "The Administration will thank the American press to let the Japanese situation alone," is the semi-official advice from Washington. Secretary of War Taft is going to make Japan a friendly visit. While diplomacy will probably die over the present bitter feeling, and there is no use attempting to disguise the fact that in Japan a very hostile feeling toward the United States exists, it is extremely probable that the next great clash of arms will be between the United States and Japan.

Japanese laborers are flooding the Pacific Coast. This is not felt to any great extent while work is so plentiful but when the American laborer goes to seek a job and finds every place that would otherwise be available filled by a little brown man, then will go up the anti-Japanese cry of the labor unions. Following this will come a Japanese exclusion law as strict as the Chinese exclusion law. Staid, imbecile old China would Japan. The little brown man will rush to arms.

They are bigoted, self-confident, arrogant and quarrelsome. They believe that no nation can stand before their fury. This nation aspires to rule all others on land and sea and there is a great probability that she hopes some day to plant her surplus hordes of little brown men on the western coast of America and under Japanese colors.

It is well that the issue be joined with Japan now as later. If our population, wants its educational institutions free from this particular rage there is no need for the government at Washington to oppose in the hope of pacifying Japan. Temporarily will not alter the ultimate designs of this ambitious people. Japan is today making preparation for a great conflict. When she is fully prepared she will strike without warning. The United States may as well realize this and it will do no harm for the press of the United States to publish freely and openly all of the facts in connection with the affair.

Change in Slashing Law.

Persons having slashing to burn, must now obtain their permits from the state fire wardens, and not from the county clerk as heretofore, the law being changed in that respect. It is not necessary to obtain a permit to burn stumps, log piles or brush heaps in small quantities, at a safe distance from other inflammable material, and under personal control. State fire wardens are appointed by the State Board of Forestry, on recommendation of property owners, who must pay him compensation as may be agreed upon, and the president of the board will appoint such wardens when requested so to do.
