FIREMEN BARBECUE SUNDAY.

Fighters of Flames Plan Programme For Annual Event.

The programme for the annual barbecue of the fire department in Canemah Park next Sunday has been outlined. The barbecue proper will be held from 10 A. M. until 1 P. M. on the ball grounds. The Aurora Band will come down to participate in the affair, heading a parade of firemen to the park in the morning. It is expected that a delegation of firemen from Estacada will arrive here Sunday morning on a special car and the first ladies of Milwaukie and St. Johns, as well as Fire Chief Campbell, of Portland, are also expected to be present. Two hundred pounds of beef will be roasted and there will be speeches by Hon. George C. Brownell, Judge Gordon E. Hayes and Judge Grant B. Dimick.

In the afternoon the sports and races will take place and the public will be admitted to the grounds. There will be a baseball game between teams from the hill and down town companies, and a tug-of-war contest between members of the Cataract Hose Company and Columbia Hook & Ladder Company vs. the Fountain Hose Company and the Hill Companies. The other sports will comprise a three-legged race, 100-yard dash, 50-yard dash for married men and fat men. Exempt as well as active firemen are invited to enjoy the good time that is being arranged, and Mayor William Shindler and the Milwaukie councilmen will be here. Prizes will be given for the winners of the contests.

WILLAMETTE TEAM BEATEN.

Has A Pleasant Excursion to Canas By Paper Mill Employees.

Five to 6 was the score of Sunday's baseball game at Canas between the Crown-Columbia Pulp & Paper Company's team of Canas, and the Willamette Pulp & Paper Company team from this city. There was a crowd of nearly 175 people on the excursion on the steamer lone and everybody had an enjoyable time. The Willamette team played a good game and is entirely satisfied with the result of the trip, as they expected to be beaten by a large score. They had had no practice and this was their first game. Shad Operations Successful.

The United States Bureau of Fisheries has discontinued operations at the shad battery below Willamette Falls. The season, though short, has been remarkably successful, nearly one and one-half million eggs having been taken and propagated. Superintendent Henry O'Malley has planted 300,000 shad fry in the waters of the Skagit River at Sedro-Wooley, and W. E. Rauch took 300,000 fry to Snohomish River. In the Willamette River 800,000 shad fry have been planted.

COUNTY TEACHERS AT SALEM.

Clackamas Pedagogues Will Have Places on the Program.

Seven Clackamas County people who are interested in education are on the programme for the seventh annual convention of the Oregon State Teachers' Association, which will be held at Salem July 1, 2 and 3. The department of superintendence, the county superintendent's convention, Marion, Linn and Polk County Institutes will be held in connection with the state association. Mrs. Eva Emory Dye, of this city, author of "McLoughlin and Old Oregon," "The Conquest," "McDonald of Oregon," and other books, will make an address Wednesday morning on "The School of the Pioneer." Prof. L. A. Read of Parkplace, will talk on "Some Phases of a County High School," Monday afternoon in Room 3 of the High School Building. The advanced section, of which Miss Mary S. Barlow of Barlow and Portland, is the leader, Prof. J. C. Zinser, superintendent of the Clackamas County Schools, will give an address Monday afternoon on "Grammar vs. Language." Miss Nellie M. Stevens, of this city, will talk Wednesday afternoon in the intermediate section on "Poetry in the School Room." In the afternoon of Wednesday Prof. T. J. Gary, principal of the Willamette school, will speak on "School Gardening." In the primary section Tuesday morning Mrs. Mildred Ruegg-Elsert, of Milwaukie, will talk on "Literature in the Grades." All general sessions will be held in the Christian Church and the department meetings will take place in the High School and Christian Church. Many Clackamas County teachers will attend the meetings.

County School Notes.

County Superintendent of Schools J. C. Zinser reports that a new school house will be built in the Meridian district, on the border line between Clackamas and Aurora Counties. Taxpayers of the Logan district are considering the advisability of making an addition to the school house, employing another teacher and adding the sixth and tenth grades. Miss Victorine Wilson and Miss Mary Wilson have been engaged to teach the next term of the Damascus school.

ROAD HOUSE ON CLACKAMAS.
