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REAR MAY COME TRUE.

For a long time the agricultur-  
al population of this country has de-  
sired an Oregon City market for farm  
produce. The dream, however, has  
never taken the form of a reality.  
The hope is now about to be realized  
through the efforts of Secret Bros.,  
of this city.

This proposition looks good on its  
face. A full realization of the ad-  
vantages to Clackamas County farm-  
ers of a commission house here will  
insure success to the enterprise. But  
to make its success certain, producers  
must be loyal to the institution they  
have long been waiting for. Since the  
presence of local merchants in the  
buying line farmers must still  
stand by the commission house. Little  
grievances must be buried in order  
to secure success to the general plan.  
The old Y. M. C. A. property is the  
property place for a commission  
house. It is convenient to most of  
the farmers coming to town, is not  
inconvenient to any, and, best of all,  
we are going to have a public wharf  
adjoining the prospective location.  
We're surely going to have it. May-  
be not in a month and maybe not for  
several months but we will keep at it  
until we get a wharf at the foot of  
Eleventh street.

Possibly Secret Brothers would  
like to know if a market is really  
wanted in Oregon City. Perhaps they  
would like to know how much in  
earnest the farmers are in wanting  
a place in Oregon City where they  
can realize the cash for their farm  
products. It might serve as an en-  
couragement for interested farmers  
to write the men who have the propo-  
sition under contemplation, giving  
them an idea as to what business they  
may expect from different localities.  
Opinions on this subject for publi-  
cation in The Courier will be wel-  
come. Let some of the busy farmers  
write The Courier as to the welcome  
a good Oregon City market would re-  
ceive from Clackamas County farm-  
ers.

#### DEVELOPMENTS ON THE CLACK- AMAS.

Manufacturing industries on the  
Clackamas would substantially boost  
this locality. A public spirited com-  
munity is always with such enter-  
prise. The success of such propo-  
sitions, however, always depends on  
the exercise of good judgment in the  
beginning.

One of the secrets of the success of  
Oregon City manufacturing enter-  
prises lies in the fact that the heads  
of these institutions have devoted their  
entire energy to manufacture. The  
development of water powers is a dis-  
tinct business in itself, and requires  
the entire energy of the promoter.  
The successful operation of woolen  
mills on the Clackamas will require  
the undivided effort of those having  
the enterprise in charge. The devel-  
opment of the Clackamas water pow-  
er should be a distinct proposition and  
both will add to the advancement of  
the community.

The plan, therefore, of leasing  
power for the operation of the mills  
is the plan that business experience  
shows to be best. The communistic  
plan of conducting many different  
enterprises under one management  
has never proven successful and a  
recognition of the general principle  
will be the greatest assurance of a  
successful culmination of the plans  
for a manufacturing district on the  
banks of the Clackamas.

#### "CHARITY BEGINS AT HOME."

Secretary Root's proposition to re-  
linquish a greater part of the 24 mil-  
lions of dollars awarded the United  
States as damages arising out of the  
Boxer uprising in China in 1901, is  
certainly a generous suggestion, but  
this scheme of the present adminis-  
tration would hardly meet the coun-  
try's approval and it is unlikely that  
Congress will endorse it. It is prob-  
ably a conception of disloyalty and  
diplomatic measure it would almost  
certainly fall short of its aim.

The theory probably is that we  
would gain in trade relations all we  
would give up in money. This is pos-  
sible but not probable. Gratitude is  
not one of the predominant character-  
istics of the Mongolian race. Good  
as we may be to China who will con-  
tinue to sell her products wherever  
the best market offers and she will  
continue to buy her flour and other  
imports wherever she can get them  
cheapest. Business relations  
have one rule and social intercourse  
another.

The United States, in this matter,  
was least exacting of all the nations  
that demanded indemnity of China.  
Russia exacted more than three  
times as much as Germany and  
France each more than twice as  
much. We may not be especially in  
need of the money, but this punish-  
ment will prove, and has proven, a  
wholesome lesson to the Oriental Em-  
pire, and this is the only successful  
method of protecting life and property  
of Americans and Europeans in China.

If our Government has more cash  
on hand than is really necessary, a  
fit place to exercise liberality would  
be in the removal of protective duties

our own people and less attention to  
that of other nations would be a gov-  
ernment policy very welcome to the  
country at large.

#### WANTS DELEGATES CHOSEN.

U'Ren Believes People Should Choose  
Members of Electoral College.

W. S. U'Ren, father of the Initia-  
tive and Referendum, believes that  
delegate conventions should be called  
for the purpose of choosing delegates  
to the national conventions and also  
to choose candidates for presidential  
electors.

"The only alternative," says Mr.  
U'Ren, "would be for the state cen-  
tral committees to appoint, or elect,  
the delegates, and it is up to the com-  
mittees to decide what shall be done."  
"When the primary law was drawn  
and adopted by the people in 1904,  
this measure was purposely left open  
for the reason that the 1907 legisla-  
ture might amend the law, which was  
first tried in June, 1906. While the  
committee was at work, the opinion  
was expressed and generally con-  
curred in, that the experiment was be-  
ing conducted on a wider scale than  
ever before. The presidential election  
was so far away that it was believed  
there was plenty of time for the leg-  
islature to provide a way to choose  
delegates to national conventions and  
candidates for presidential electors.  
After the law had been tried, if it  
seemed necessary to do so, it was  
also agreed that if legislature failed  
to provide the manner of electing de-  
legates, that the state central com-  
mittees of the parties that might be af-  
fected by the law could, and probably  
would, call a regular convention.  
"In other states it has been the cus-  
tom for the state central committees  
either to name the delegates or to  
call a convention, but the usage has  
not been uniform. It is wholly for  
the state central committee to decide  
whether they shall call a regular dele-  
gate convention, as has been done  
heretofore, to choose delegates to  
national conventions."

#### WORK OF HOME COMPANY.

Underground Cable Will Be Placed  
This Week.

The Home Telephone Company has  
begun the work of stringing the con-  
ductor rods through the underground  
conduits on Main street, and by the  
end of the week it is expected that  
the underground cable will all be in.  
The aerial cable is all in place now,  
and a force of men is at work doing  
the inside wiring. The aerial cable on  
7th street is put up as well as any  
in the country, and the superinten-  
dent of construction, T. J. Reddy, says  
that it will never sag.

The construction work that the com-  
pany has been doing in this city pre-  
sents some novel features in tele-  
phone engineering. Where the cable  
is taken over the bluff on Sixth street,  
instead of running to the top of a  
pole on the bluff, the company has put  
in a very expensive piece of under-  
ground work, blasting a trench six  
feet deep so that the cable is  
stretched from the distributing pole  
on lower Sixth street through the un-  
derground, and then to a pole set  
back some fifty feet from the face of  
the bluff. This makes a more sub-  
stantial construction.

A wagon will be started this week  
with a force of men running drops  
from the poles to the houses. There  
are many subscribers already for the  
company to serve, and this work will  
take some time. It will be rushed as  
fast as possible, however, and it is  
thought that the company will be  
giving service over the new phones  
some time during August.

Superintendent Reddy is responsi-  
ble for the rapidity with which the  
work has moved along so far. He is  
an old telephone man, and under-  
stands the business thoroughly. It is  
due to his tact and diplomacy that  
the work has moved along as smoothly  
as they have with the new company.
