FRANCHISE FOR GAS.

Ordinance Will Be Presented to Council by Oregon Gas, Mfg. Co.

Contrary to expectations, the representatives of the Oregon Gas Manufacturing Company did not appear Wednesday night before the city council to present their ordinance, asking for a franchise for 25 years to erect a plant for the manufacture and sale of fuel and illuminating gas, to lay mains throughout the city and to do other things necessary for the operation and maintenance of a well equipped plant.

The company plans to spend more than \$50,000 here, and have its plant in operation before the year is out. The proposed ordinance was presented Tuesday night to a committee of the Board of Trade, consisting of Thomas F. Ryan, Captain James P. Shaw, D. C. Ely, John Adams and George Randall. William Adams, representing the company, was up from Portland to attend the meeting, and the terms of the ordinance, which provides that gas shall be sold from 50 to 75 cents per thousand feet, according to the quantity consumed by the customer, that for the first five years of the franchise the company shall pay \$200 per annum, for the next five years, \$500 per annum, and for the remaining fifteen years, one per cent of the gross earnings, or not less than \$700 per annum.

At the expiration of the franchise, it is provided that the city make take over the plant, if it desires, the price to be determined by three men, one of whom shall be chosen by the company, one by the city and the third by the two umpires. If the committee of three cannot agree the matter will be thrown into a court of equity.

UP TO THE COUNTY.

City Will Have Rotten Plank on Mt. Pleasant Road Removed.

The Committee on Streets have ordered the plank road between Oregon City and Mount Pleasant taken up so that the county may lay a good road. This street of highway has long been a thorn in the flesh to the farmers who have to traverse it on their way to town. The planks have become worn and rotted, and the road is worse than a strip of corduroy. If the County Court decides to put down a good road such as it has ordered in other parts of the county it will make a great difference in the comfort of those who have to use this way in coming to town.

FOR GENERAL WEAR.

Fabrics and Styles Are Now Well Developed.

Although many persons think that all social functions cease after Easter, there will be many very swell affairs about that time, and for just such are the modistes making preparations now. Few of the evening gowns, even when they are for the quite young, are of flimsy material such as would seem by right to belong to youth. We now see velvet dresses made for very young debutantes and also silks of quite heavy texture made with deep bands of velvet at the foot. Messalines, satins, surahs, taffetas and such weaves seem to be better liked than the thin silks, yet we see some of the sheerer qualities frequently. Some of the evening silks have a soft finish that makes them as flexible as crapa, and, while they are really substantial, the effect is that of very thin silk. This special quality is generally extra lustrous, so that in some colors it seems almost metallic. Then there are also real thin silks made expressly for the purpose of being made up over silk of some sharply contrasting color to obtain new effects by the two colors combining as the wearer moves. Blue and red, pink and blue and blue and yellow are the most effective, though many other colors are employed in the carrying out of this plan.

The illustration shows a gown for a young lady in this same general plan. The underdress is bright crimson yellow, with a pink silk overdress of the thin and transparent quality mentioned above. This bestows a delicate warmth of color impossible to describe, but very beautiful. All around the skirt, sleeves and yoke is a system of yellow chenille balls set along the scalloped edge. Above is a line of half wreaths of pink roses made of chiffon, with the stems and foliage in the same tint. A band of pink ribbon is laid over the shoulders and finished by the shoulders and finished by the arrangement of the yellow silk covering with silk mull of the same shade and sleeves of the same beneath the double folded ones of the embroidered silk. A folded belt of the ribbon is draped around the waist.

One might call this a representative gown, for many variations can be made of it by substituting different materials or colors. The chenille embroidery on thin stuffs is very fetching and will be seen on many things, notably laces for trimmings. And the dainty little flowers of chiffon or crepe lisse are to be found in great numbers on the most elaborate evening gowns and even sometimes on opera cloaks. They are also frequently made of silk ribbon or velvet ribbon for ornamenting hats.

For outdoor wear there are many pony suits, some handsome tailor made

costumes, Eton suits and sack suits. The pony coats are shown in black, navy blue, brown and russet pattern and some of the chevrons carrying the season's colors. Dainty shepherd's plaids in shadow checks and black and white are made up in the same general style, but with combination roll and notch collars with plique facings. The mannish mixtures, mostly gray, are in Eton styles, with very feminine trimming of fancy braids and with lace vest, collar and cuffs. The sack suits are strapped in such a way that the straps form a trimming sufficiently noticeable. Some of these are of silk, but most are of fine and good quality of some handsome English goods. The jackets are always lined with soft silk, and the skirt is plaited sometimes in kilts, but generally only from the hips down. The broad trimming that has been obtained for three seasons is even more in evidence than ever, some of it being very rich and beautiful.

The silks most in vogue for the new gowns and suits are calcium in high luster, soft and flexible in feel, mouselines with pretty printed borders representing dainty blossoms, heavy brocades, damasks, print warps, checks in steel and tin, black and white taffeta in narrow stripes, jacquard weaves and no end of plaids, some in clan colors and designs. Black silk is to be more worn than for many years instead of so much broadcloth. There is some fine chiffon broadcloth in various colors. There are many novelties in silk and wool fabrics, marquisettes, tweed, mixed chevrons and no end to the thin weaves in velles and other stuffs of that kind. They are in quite light weights, and all will make up well.

DEATH OF GEORGE A. FULLER.

Master of New York State Grange Expires Suddenly of Heart Disease.

A severe blow has fallen upon the New York state grange in the death of State Master George A. Fuller, which occurred at his home in Philadelphia, N. Y., on March 1. Death is believed to have been due to acute indigestion and its direct effect upon a heart weakness with which he had been troubled for some time.

Mr. Fuller was born on Edgewood farm, near Philadelphia, N. Y., on July 23, 1837. He received his education in

the common schools, Ives seminary and the Potomac Normal school. For two years after leaving the normal school he taught in the schools of northern New York. In 1888 he married Hattie May Randall of Black River, N. Y., and they have one son, Glenn L. Fuller. In 1888 Mr. Fuller's father died, and he assumed active management of Edgewood farm, which has since been his principal business. In 1891 Mr. Fuller joined Philadelphia grange, No. 114, and has served as its secretary, lecturer, overseer and master of Jefferson county Pomona grange and was overseer of New York state grange during 1900-1906. At the 1906 session of the New York state grange he was elected unanimously to the office of master.

Mr. Fuller was nominated for state treasurer by the Independence league last September and was assured of the nomination for the same office on the Democratic ticket, but, to his great honor, he stated, he declined to accept the nomination in order that he might give his entire time and attention to the work of the grange.

George Fuller was every inch a man. His character was as sturdy as the oak, and his ideas of right and wrong were so immovably fixed that no man could question his integrity. With a broad knowledge of the needs and purposes of the grange, with a thorough consecration to the work which demanded so much of his time and attention, with a culture of mind, a kindness of spirit and a genial and gentlemanly bearing, he was unusually well equipped for the honorable position which he held at the head of our Order in the state.

F. N. Godfrey, overseer of the state grange, will succeed Mr. Fuller as state master for the balance of the term. Mr. Godfrey is a resident of Olean, N. Y., and a man thoroughly in sympathy with the policies which the late master has inaugurated.

A CO-OPERATIVE SCHEME.

How Maine Granges Propose to Get Better Prices For Farm Produce.

The co-operative committee of the Pomona granges of Maine is devising a plan for a system of marketing farm products whereby the commission men's profits may be saved to the producer. A system of storage houses is proposed which may be owned by one or more farmers, but each farmer is to keep his crops separate in the storage house, so that when sold he may get the benefit of his own labor. Thus apples carefully packed and graded need not help to sell another's apples carelessly packed and not graded.

The association thus handling thousands of bushels of fruit would be able to control the export trade in the state. It is understood that the farmer would be under no obligations to have his crop sold by the association, but would attend to it himself if he chose to, but all producers will be required to come up to the standard set by the association. If this plan of co-operative selling proves successful, it is likely to be adopted in other states. It will be watched with much interest—Country Gentleman.
