Hon. Frank Stewart Reagan gave the last of his great cartoon lectures Monday afternoon on "The American Small Boy," and kept his audiences in a ripple of humor, punctuated with pathos and wisdom. It is not strange that Mr. Reagan, the prohibitionist, easily won out over less talented and eloquent opponents in the political field. He has promised that his pictures of Mount Hood and the Columbia River will hereafter appear in his Eastern lectures, and he will be a good boomer for the Northwest and Oregon in particular.

Mrs. Lucia Faxon Addison talked on the Consumers League, emphasizing the various points of what constituted an enlightened purchaser. There was a very large and attentive audience present.

Chautauqua had another one of its big days and the attendance was promising Tuesday, when United States Senator Elmer J. Burkett, of Nebraska, delivered his first lecture of the session on "The New Woman and the Oung Man." The distinguished speaker was introduced by Congressman W. C. Hawley, who spoke in a humorous vein, telling many amusing stories that made the crowd laugh.

The lecture of Dr. Frank G. Smith, of the Warren Avenue Congregational Church, Tuesday afternoon was one of the best that has been heard here. Dr. Smith surprised everyone by one that heard him by his eloquence. He talked on "The Man For Our Times."

"If there are four letters in the English alphabet that mean more to me than any other letters, they are h-o-m-e. It takes all there is in one man and one woman and all the children there is and God Almighty in the bargain to make the ideal home. The great trouble is that we have so many men who are great on dress parade but little in their own home. Of course you do not have this kind of men out here in this great new country, but we have them in the East. He must love his flag and his country more than party or

self."
