The first automobile ever seen out here passed through Sunday morning. Dix Bros' sawmill is run only two

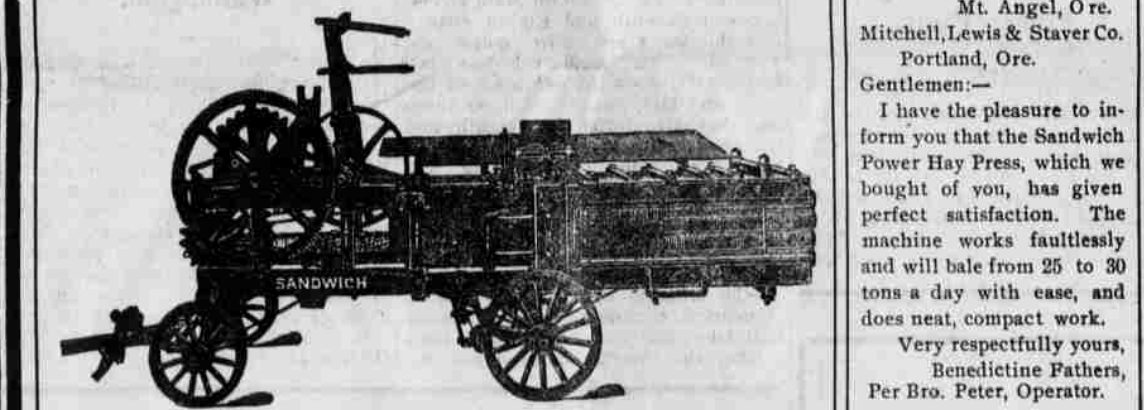
